Edgar Pierce appeared before the Commission and asked that his re. marks be included in the City records. Mr. Pierce expressed his appreciation of the fine work the men in the local fire department rendered in fighting the recent fire that burned his garage. He also suggested that the firemen should be better equipped to fight our fires.

Motion made by Otis and supported by Nacker that the motion made by Griffith and supported by Hulet at the regular meeting held January 14, 1942, in regard to the appointment of a Chief of Police, and also the amendment thereto, passed by the Commission, be rescinded. Roll Call: Yes, Hamlin, Nacker, Bagnall and Otis. Hulet and Griffith not voting. Motion carried.

Motion made by Bagnall and supported by Nacker that the resignation of Charles Kowalski be accepted as of February 1, 1942. Carried.

Motion made by Hamlin and supported by Otis that Joseph E. Vriend be appointed to the office of Chief of Police to fill the unexpired term, ending July 1, 1942, at a salary of \$21,000.00 per year. Roll Call: Yes, Hamlin, Nacker, Bagnall and Otis. Naya, Hulet and Griffith.

Mr. Hulet asked the Mayor to accept his resignation as Police Commissioner to take effect immediately. Mayor Gildemeister accepted the resignation of Police Commissioner Hulet.

Motion made by Otis and supported by Nacker to adjourn. Carried.
