FAMOUS ARTISTS TO BE FEATURED IN DETROIT OPERAS

Good news to music lovers! Detroit is to have two weeks of grand opera, to be presented at popular prices at the Wilton Theatre beginning Sunday, Feb. 22, by the Columbia Opera Company.
Armand Begoroy, New York born manager of the company, is proud that its personnel is almost 100 per cent American, except for one or two of the great stars. To be sure, many of the artists have studied and sung abroad; but most of them have gained their entire operatic experience in the United States.

Although this company has never appeared in Detroit, it comes here highly recommended for its splendid ensembles and its magnificent principals, who have scored outstanding successes in the East and in Canada. The Columbia Opera Company recently completed a tour of Canada, playing Montreal, Quebec, Toronto and smaller cities, and critics hailed the performances as the best seen in those localities for the last 20 years.

In addition to the regular roster of artists, the Columbia will present several well known guest singers—outstanding stars of concert and stage, as well as in the operatic field.

They include Michael Bartlett, star of the opera, concert stage, cinema and radio, who sang with Grace Moore in "Love Me Forever" and "One Night of Love"; three former members of the Metropolitan Opera Company—Margaret Matzenauer, contralto; Ralph Errol, tenor; and Arthur Anderson, bass; Lucille Manners, lovely soprano of the air waves; Ethel Barrymore, daughter of Ethel Barrymore and the first member of her talented family to enter grand opera; and Virginia Pennington of the Chicago Civic Opera.

SALVAGE CAMPAIGN IS ESSENTIAL TO OUR WAR EFFORT

A renewed plea for waste material was voiced this week by officials of the Oakland County Defense Council, as they pressed their "Salvage for Victory" campaign into every nook and cranny of the county.

Stressing the importance of their campaign, they urged farmers to assemble scrap iron that they may have accumulated from worn parts of machinery and they called on housewives to collect waste paper, magazines, rags and metals for which they have no further use.

Chairman O. L. Beaudette of the salvage committee, pointing out that the cooperation of every man, woman and child in the nation is necessary if America is successfully to prosecute the war, declared:

"Small bits of metal which one might think too insignificant to be of value might go toward making one bullet that will bring us just that much closer to victory. I sincerely urge every man, woman and child in Oakland county to help us in this campaign for without that help we cannot be successful in our drive."

Shortly, the chairman said, notices will be published giving the location of scrap deposit centers where all may take their waste material. Until then, he added, anyone desiring to sell their metals or papers to regular dealers are urged to do so.

The committee has but one objective:

To get the so-called waste materials into foundries of war, not matter whether it be sold or donated.

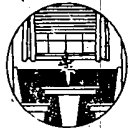
