## Certify Workers In Southfield

In answer to questions which have come up regarding the qualifications of a raid warden for the Southfield Township, the Civilian Defense Council wishes it known that all wardens have been appointed under the direction of Arthur Bouchard, Chief Air Raid Warden of the township, with A. L. Jayne and E. Christensen assisting him as Deputy Wardens.

As a part of these wardens have qualified by completing the 10 hour training course now going on, they will all be certified, fingerprinted, together with all other requirements set up by the federal Office of Civilian Defense.

It is believed that many people do not realize the great amount of work that has gone into the defense preparations in this township. To date the air raid warden organization has been completed. The wardens will soon start their survey of the township homes and with the proper precautions and furnishing each home in the township with much valuable information.

Fire Warden and Police protection organization are now in the process of growth and will be completed within a very short time. John Bell, Chief Fire Warden, said Kenneth H. McQueen, Chief of Police protection will have important announcements regarding this work within the very near future.

The one handicap that these organizations have is the fact that Southfield Township has no organized fire or police protection forces around which to build these defense preparations as is done in all cities and towns. However the problem is being solved.

It is important to remember that to serve all Civilian Defense purposes one must be registered for Civilian Defense. Matthew L. Kuykendall, in charge of registration on the Council, has stated that over 1000 people have now registered in the township. Mrs. D. K. Schadt, air raid class instructor, has announced that well over 1000 people were registered in her four classes during the week. She also announced that she will be glad to organize classes to meet mornings for those people who work afternoons and nights.
