Red Cross Reports Progress On Training Classes and Projects

Nearly 6,500 Oakland County residents are receiving specialized civilian defense instruction under the direction of the American Red Cross. It was revealed today by Byron R. Webb, chairman of the Oakland County Chapter. In a timely roundup of the activities of the Red Cross, Mr. Webb outlined several of the varied services offered by the chapter.

At the present time, 5,370 persons are attending first aid classes. The 174 classes now underway are taught by 51 physicians and 34 lay instructors. Thirty seven home nursing classes are being conducted by 235 county women. On completion of this course the women will be well equipped to handle most health problems in their own homes.

Approximately 500 women in twelve nutrition classes are receiving instruction which will enable them to plan better for the nutritional needs of their families. Two hundred of these women already have enrolled in a canteen course preparing to do mass feeding in any emergency.

Sixty nurses aides are now under instruction at Pontiac City Hospital and St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital. These nurses aides have agreed to volunteer their time and services in the hospitals at the end

REPRESENTATIVE OF SPRAY FIRM WRITES ARTICLES

Following is the first in a series of articles prepared by Jack W. Willboe, local representative of the California Spray-Chemical Corporation. Mr. Willboe has written these articles for the use of fruit growers in this area, in response to a number of requests for this information.

Spray Notes

Shortages of raw materials and packages in the chemical industry during these trying times are making it necessary for everyone using and handling spray materials to look into the future for his needs. Also, every grower should clean out his sprayer and oil drums when they are empty, and return them to his dealer. Keep them rolling. If each grower and dealer, as well, will exercise every effort possible to conserve material and raise the best crop ever produced, he is doing his part, but not until this is achieved will he be doing his utmost to aid in our war effort.

Liquid, Lime Sulphur versus Wettable Sulphurs is the problem confronting many apple growers. In the first place, we know that the liquid will burn apple scab out and at the same time burn the foliage which is needed to mature a large crop. It is a prevention as well as a cure but year after year results in low yields.

The so-called wettable sulphurs are good preventatives but will not burn out scab infection once it has entered the leaves or fruit, and in the same breath it does not tend to burn the foliage and reduce yields. With wettable, it is necessary to bring your spray application close together in order to prevent the scab from gaining entrance to the leaf tissue.

It seems that one of the greatest experimental discoveries in regard to apple scab control with wettable sulphurs is the discovery of new liquid stickers and spreaders which hold the sulphur on the leaves during adverse weather conditions, at the same time they help build up large sulphur deposits which give the wettable sulphurs a much greater advantage than they have had previously. These adhesives may be used until second or third cover sprays at which time scab infections have subsided and hot weather prohibits their use.
