Private Vehicles Barred The elimination of street and traffic lights requires a new set of laws for motorists for no private vehicle is allowed to be in motion on the streets during a blackout. Only ambulances, vehicles of the armed forces, police, fire department, repair squads, defense officials, and physicians will be allowed to travel.

Even the pedestrian has his own set of regulations. Whenever an air raid warning is given, all persons except those duly authorized must instantly leave the streets and head for cover. They should avoid crossing streets and public places as much as possible. Under the Detroit ordinance, it is unlawful to congregate outside in groups of five or more during the period of any air raid.

Violation of any provision of the ordinance in Detroit, is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500 or imprisonment up to 90 days, or both. The rules are strict, but not over-harsh. All regulations are based upon common sense, and if every man, woman and child does his part to the utmost, defense of Detroit and the surrounding area, including Farmington, will be greatly assured.
