A FIGHTING MAN AND HIS MEN

Australia, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands have conferred on him the title of "Commander-in-Chief of general headquarters of the southwest Pacific area."

FARMERS ASKED TO AID WPA IN SCRAP DRIVE

One hundred pounds of scrap steel baled and ready to be fed to the mills replaces one hundred pounds of new pig iron.

To make 100 pounds of pig iron requires 500 pounds of iron ore. There are said to be mined and transported by rail or water from 500 to 600 miles to reach the mill.

It takes 150 pounds of coal to smelt the ore. That coal has to be mined and transported. It takes 50 pounds of limestone which also must be quarried and transported.

In order to get this much needed scrap, WPA will be sending trucks to the 200,000 farms in Michigan.

Farmers who have scrap—old every farm has an average of 500 pounds of it—may donate it or sell it to Uncle Sam. It is the first time the government has accepted donations from its citizens. The minute it is donated it becomes government property and will be sold to the highest bidder to make guns, tanks, shells and other things needed by our men in the Army and Navy and Marine Corps.

Gather up all the old scrap you can; metal beds, stoves, old heaters, iron millings, hardware, broken implements; everything but tin cans.

Scrap is important and is needed now!

Waterford has been designated as the concentration point for Oakland County and the facilities of the Waterford Fuel & Supply Company have been gladly donated for its storage.

A display card, showing your cooperation in this "Scrap for Victory" drive will be given to those who donate or sell their scrap.

If you have already disposed of your scrap, stop at the Concentration point for your card.

"My Scrap is Going to War" will be the theme of a rally, which will be staged in the Coliseum at the Michigan State Fair Grounds, Friday, April 24th, with more than 12,000 WPA workers, their relatives and friends in attendance. A continuous floor show, lasting two hours, is planned.

Scrap, preferably scrap iron or rubber, will be admission to the rally. Every person who attends must bring along some kind of scrap metal or old rubber, with the exception of tin cans.
