

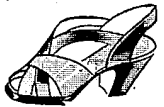
BAPTIST CHURCH NEWS

The Kentucky, by Thomas D. Clark. Latest in the "Rivers of America" series, this story of the Kentucky River and its name-state is a valuable addition to the literature of the South. Mr. Clark sketches the history of Kentucky from the days of Daniel Boone and his courageous followers down to the present, including in the book legends and characters of the river country overlooked in other works. There is the story of rich silver mines, their location a secret that died with John Swift in 1760; a ray history of Sally War, fascinating and often-wedded belle of the Civil War days; stories of life among the aristocrats of the bluegrass country, mingled with accounts of Kentucky mountaineers, and the days when "moonshining" was at its height. The river itself and the regions through which it flows are beautifully described.
A Toast to Tomorrow, by Manning Cotes. A fast-moving spy story, with a plot that's really different. Falling victim to amnesia in 1918, Klaus Lehmann builds a new life for himself, becoming an intimate of Hitler's and one of the founders of the Nazi party. Just as his political dreams are realized, with Hitler master of Germany and himself the Fuehrer's most trusted official, Lehmann's memory returns; the breath-taking discovery of his real identity leads him—and the reader—from one thrilling situation to another. The suspense and action of the book are sustained to the last page.
Mission to Moscow, by Joseph E. Davies. The record of the United States Ambassador's years in Russia, from 1936 to 1943, taken from confidential dispatches to the State Department, Davies' personal correspondence and diary, and notes made after his return to this country. The opinions reached by a keen and open mind after two years of close observation make valuable reading, and the ambassador's shrewd judgments of high Soviet officials, the Russian people, and the success of the Communist form of government will interest every follower of current events.
Dragon Seed, by Pearl S. Buck. This latest novel by one of the best portrayals of modern China describes the life of a typical peasant family in the section of China occupied by the Japanese. Through four years of terrible tyranny Ling Tan, his wife Ling Sao, their sons, daughters, and grandchildren resist the conquerors silently and fiercely, allying themselves with the guerrillas in the hills and learning to hide their guns behind the mask of stupidity. Closing on a note of hope for the future of China, the book is an inspiring picture of a people defeated, but never conquered.

THE GARDEN PATH
Watch your lawn carefully this year... Japanese beetles and June bugs are particularly bad in this district just now, and their large white eggs may soon be busy destroying your carefully nurtured grass... Apply arsenate of lead to grub-infested turf (about five pounds mixed with 50 pounds of sand for every 500 square feet). Spread when grass is dry, and then water in well to protect your pets.
Gladiolus and other summer-flowering bulbs can be set out now, and annuals should be transplanted to the garden... Choose a cloudy day to move them. In the vegetable garden, this is the time to sow bush beans, beets, lettuce, peas, and sweet corn.
Plant your annuals with an eye to attractive color combinations... even flowers have their likes and dislikes in the matter of neighbors... Annual Anemone, or summer forget-me-not, blooms at the same time as Thalictrum, or meadow rue, and its deep blue flowers blend beautifully with the rosy purple blossoms of the latter.
Another lovely combination is deep purple Salvia with the Dolly Madison geum, a rich peach color... the pale salmon-pink foxglove (digitalis lutea) is at its best when planted near the brilliant blue Delphinium belladonna.
Boraginaceae flowers in mixed or solid colors, do a great deal to enhance the other flower shades. The Little Blue Star Ageratum forms a ribbon of deep blue about the garden, while the same effect in yellow can be obtained with the lovely Border of Gold flowers.
The little in Latin is Tagetes Signat Pinnatifida. For a border of mixed colors, there is the easily grown Leptochloa, which comes in shades of yellow, orange, light cream, etc... It is particularly effective in rock gardens.

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MRS. ISAAC BOND ATTENDS WOMEN'S CONFERENCE

Mrs. Isaac Bond, president of the Farmington Women's Club, attended the Conservation Conference held at Pontiac on May 14 and 15. The conference was co-sponsored by the Oakland County Federation of Women's Clubs and the Michigan Department of Conservation, and an interesting and informative schedule had been arranged by the two organizations.

Lectures on the opening day were delivered by Miss Helen Martin, Research Geologist of the Michigan Department of Conservation, who spoke on "The Foundations of Oakland County"; Mr. Leonard Braasche, Extension Soil Conservationist of Michigan State College, whose subject was "Soil Conservation"; Mrs. C. A. Faquin, who discussed the work of the Michigan Department of Conservation; and Ruth Mosher Place, garden editor of the Detroit News, who explained Michigan's plan for the national Victory Garden program. A panel jury discussion on "Vacation and Recreation vs. Rubber Rationing and Conservation" concluded the day's session. A field trip occupied the second half of the conference, during which members visited points of interest in Oakland County. Mrs. Marie Bligham, botanist at the Cranbrook Institute of Science and president of the Michigan Wildflower Association, told the group about the different wildflowers, trees and plants seen during the day, while birds native to Oakland County were pointed out by Mr. Walter Nichol, Cranbrook Institute of Science, and president of the Detroit Audubon Club.

A WORD TO THE WIVES

For those days when you haven't much time to prepare dinner, and the family appetite is as large as ever, try this recipe.

- Chicken-a-Dish**
4 tbsp shortening
1 medium onion, chopped
2 green peppers, sliced
1 lb. hamburger
1 1/2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
2 eggs
2 cups canned corn
4 medium tomatoes, sliced
1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
Put shortening in skillet and lightly fry peppers and onion for three minutes. Then add meat and blend thoroughly. Add seasonings. Remove from range. Stir in eggs, and mix well. Put 1 cup corn in baking dish and then half the meat mixture, then a layer of sliced tomatoes. Then another layer each of corn, meat, and tomatoes. Cover with bread crumbs. Dot generously with bits of butter. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 35 to 45 minutes.

Keeping Pie Crust Crisp
When taking a pie from the oven do not put it on flat surface of a table to cool, but on a high wire rack. The rack helps to keep the crust crisp.
