### OREGON AND VANCOUVER SHELLED



Six to nine Jap shells, landing on the Oregon coastline, near Seaside, Monday, June 22, brought the war to the United States mainland for the second time since Pearl Harbor. The shells, which the fourth army headquarters at San Francisco declared were fired from an "unidentified craft," landed at 11:30 p. m. Pacific war time, on June 21. Firing lasted about fifteen minutes and no damage or casualties were reported, according to the announcement. This attack followed by about 21 hours submarine shelling of the Canadian government radio station at Estevan, Vancouver Island. No damage occurred there either.
