HARRISBURG TO PITTSBURGH
 The Pennsylvania Turnpike
 This country has been asleep for the past 10 years.

Back in the middle of the great depression, when good jobs were scarce, you read about in books and work of the pick and shovel type was manufactured that folks might eat, some thinking person advanced the idea of building a super-highway system throughout our country. He advanced the thought that such a system, in addition to the thousands of jobs it would provide, would be of inestimable value to one of our leading industries—tourist travel, as well as being self-liquidating because people would travel such a dream highway. Thus not only would work be provided to help kill the depression, but our country would gain a great national asset especially in time of war.

Like most good ideas born during the depression, this meritless thought died a sudden death. Countless billions were spent or the wheelbarrow type of work project but the super-highway system still remains a fragment of the imagination. The greatest idea of this generation passed away in the infancy. A sleep of the Rip Van Winkle type must have settled over Washington.

I said that this great idea died in its infancy. As a national project that statement is true. As a local project the thought bore fruit. The State of Pennsylvania saw the light and built such a road from Pittsburgh to Harrisburg—160 miles in length. I traveled this

road yesterday for the first time, and, for the first time, I know the real pleasure of driving an automobile.
 Down through central Pennsylvania the Allegheny Mountains form a natural barrier between the east and the middle-west. Heavily wooded ridges stretch far into the distance—beautiful to look upon but as tough to drive as you will find anywhere in the country. For 160 miles it up and down steep mountain grades with sharp curves at every turn.
 In 1937 the Pennsylvania Legislature created the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission. Through a PWA grant and an additional loan from our Federal Government a super-highway toll-road was built through this stretch of mountainous country. By piercing the mountain ridges with T tunnels for a total cost of 67 miles and filling the low spots, an almost level road was constructed all the way. It is the greatest piece of highway in the entire United States.
 For 160 miles you travel a 4-lane divided road without a road or railroad intersection all the way. Over 90% of the causes of accidents have been removed—cross-roads and railroads over or under-pass—there are even tunnels for pedestrians. It's a safe road and a paying one. It costs a penny a mile for automobiles to travel it and it's cheaper for trucks with T tunnels and at a much higher cost. War materials speed over it on their way to the front. They get there in a hurry too. On the worst curve I saw this sign—
 "Slow down to 60 miles per hour."

BUILDING NAMED DOWNTOWN AIR RAID SHELTER

One hundred and eight buildings, located in all sections of Detroit, which have been classified by the Detroit Office of Civilian Defense as "preferred shelters" in the event of enemy air attack, were listed today by Glenn C. Richards, OCD Director.
 The buildings, first to be so designated by the OCD, have a normal occupancy of approximately 23,000 persons and can shelter an additional 43,000 Detroiters in event of a raid.
 This group of buildings represents the first group to have been offered to the OCD by the owners or lessors as air raid shelters and which, after inspection by the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering, have been accepted for this purpose. Each of the designated shelters will be equipped with a sign stating that the building has been approved for sheltering many "public persons." In every instance the owner or lessee of the building has voluntarily offered his building as a shelter.
 The five Detroit buildings which have agreed to shelter the greatest number of Detroiters in case of an actual air raid are Robinson Furniture Company, Detroit Leland Hotel, OCD Headquarters in the Old Barium Hotel, Fort Shelby Hotel and Wolverine Hotel.

A study was made of all buildings which were considered suitable for use as possible air raid shelters. Owners or lessors were contacted and given a consent blank to sign and return to the department. The blank stated when the building would be available for refuge purposes, what part of the building could be used for sheltering public persons and how many designated as air raid wardens and what kind of first aid equipment was available in the building.
 "Our designation of buildings as preferred shelters, in every case was based on allowing the greatest close to the fire foot from the structure," Mr. Richards explained.
 "We all know that almost no building is safe from a direct hit by a large, high explosive bomb. We also tried, wherever possible, to eliminate the lower three floors in order to reduce the effects of the shrapnel and gas, and the upper four floors in order to be comparatively safe from high explosive bombing hits. However, in some instances where buildings had only a few stories but seemed to be the best available shelter in their neighborhood, we have utilized them.
 "We feel that when buildings owners fully understand the need, and when we offer them the help of air raid wardens to guard the interior of the building during bombing raids, we will receive many more offers of buildings as public shelters," Mr. Richards said.

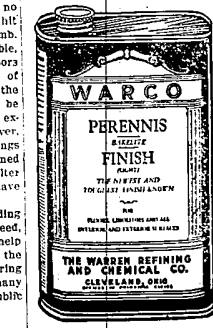
