## ANNUAL REPORT JOHN GRACE PUBLIC SCHOOL, DISTRICT No. 5, DETROIT, MICHIGAN

Annual meeting of the Board of Education of District No. 9 held at the John Grace School, Monday, July 13th, 1942.  
Meeting called to order at 8:20 p.m., President Will J. Oliver in the chair.  
Other members of the Board present were Ollie Kallman, Eva Tusch and Elmer Hardow. Absent Roland Charpenier.  
The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.  
The receipts and disbursements for the year were read. The treasurer's report of the amounts in the various bank accounts was read.  
Under new business the election of two trustees was in order, the three year terms of Elmer Hardow and Mrs. Kallman having expired.  
Mr. Doe nominated Mrs. Kallman, supported by Mrs. Tesch. No other nominations, Mr. Ed Combs moved nominations be closed. Supported by Mrs. Nunnob. Motion carried.  
Mr. Jayne and Mr. Haskin were appointed tellers. Votes cast 46.  
Mrs. Kallman 46 votes. Mrs. Kallman duly elected trustee for a term of three years.  
Mr. Haskin nominated Mr. Edwin Combs, supported by Mr. Hardow. No other nominations. Mr. Jayne moved nominations be closed. Supported by Mr. George Combs. Motion carried. Votes cast 44. Ed Combs 41, Mr. Jayne 1, two blanks. Mr. Combs duly elected trustee for a term of three years.  
Motion by Mr. Doe supported by Mr. Haskin the money in the School Bus Fund be transferred to the General Fund and any tax money coming into this fund automatically be deposited in the General Fund. This was voted on by ballot. Votes cast 34. Yeas 34; Nays none. Motion carried.  
Motion by Mr. Doe supported by Mr. Haskin the money in the Old Debt Service Fund be transferred to the Certificate of Indebtedness Fund. This was voted on by roll call. 31 yeas answered roll call. No nays. Motion carried.  
Motion by Mr. Haskin supported by Mrs. Hydorn, the salaries of the Board of Education remain at present figure. Motion carried.  
Motion by Mr. Levey supported by Mrs. Meyner, the school year shall be forty weeks. Carried.  
Motion by Mr. Doe supported by Mrs. Meyner, the School Board appoint a committee from their own body to look into transportation facilities for High School pupils. Carried.  
Motion by Mr. Doe supported by Mr. Ed Combs no tuition be paid for High School students in excess of \$100.00. A standing vote was taken on this motion. For 21; against 7. Motion carried.  
Motion by Mrs. Doe supported by Mr. George Combs to adjourn. Carried. Adjournment 10:35 p.m.

## ANNUAL REPORT SCHOOL DISTRICT No. 5

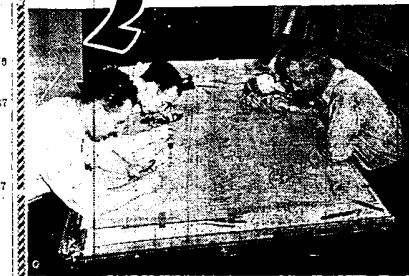
