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### Registration Is Clarified

There has been so much question and confusion regarding the registration of women for work in Detroit area war plants that the Office of War Information has issued a bulletin to newspapers, asking them to clarify this situation.

The program is a voluntary registration of women in the Detroit metropolitan area over 18 years of age. The registration is not compulsory, nor is it mandatory. Its purpose is to determine the number of women available and willing to take jobs in war plants.

With a reservoir of potential women workers thus built up, the Detroit area will be in a position to tap this supply as soon as, and not until, all available male workers have been absorbed by the expanding war industries. There is no compulsion to register; women are urged to fill out the cards voluntarily, indicating their degree of availability for war plant work.

According to the best estimates, provided material is available, war industries in the Detroit area will have absorbed the diminishing supply of male workers by early fall. Women will be needed for almost every kind of work, to meet Detroit's vital war production schedules.

The registration is being conducted under the joint auspices of the War Production Board, the United States Employment Service and the War Manpower Commission, with the Post Office Department providing the mail carrier service for delivery of registration cards.

The registration will embrace all of Wayne County and portions of Macomb, Washtenaw and Oakland Counties that include the major war plants and population centers.

During the week of August 1, registration cards will be delivered to homes and apartments by mail carriers. Instructions on the card explain in detail the significance of the drive and how the card is to be filled out. The form should be completed by every woman over 18 years old who is capable of working, whether or not she now is employed. She is urged to return the completed card, which is self-addressed and postage-free, within 48 hours.

Registrants will be called in for interviews as the need for manpower arises.

It is important that women understand in registering that the need for them is a future need. Only a limited amount of hiring of women in war plants is being done at present. All of the available male workers will be placed in war jobs before the supply of women in the registration pool is tapped.
