Two Sentenced To County Jail

A variety of cases came before Justice Court last week. Besides many fines levied, two jail sentences were meted out by Justice John J. Schulte.

Edward Hayes, arrested on August 10 for vagrancy in Farmington Township, was sentenced to sixty days in the Oakland County Jail.

Francis Caldwell, 28318 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington, was arrested for driving with a revoked operator's license. He was picked up at Orchard Lake and 12 miles away in the Township. Caldwell was sentenced to ten days in the Oakland County Jail.

On a complaint filed July 6, Fred Hodey was charged with selling and furnishing intoxicating liquors and beer without having obtained a license. He was arraigned on July 6, and demanded examination. The count of disorderly conduct was added against Hodey on July 21, and he pleaded guilty. Given \$15.00 costs or 30 days in jail, Hodey paid the fine and costs.

Costs of \$5.00 were paid by Harvey Dilks, 6556 Anstett, Detroit, for using 1941 trailer plates on "Tex" Mike, west of US-24 in Southfield Township.

Robert Townsend, 3860 Johns, Grand Rapids, was given a summons for improper overtaking and passing on a hill on US-16 in Farmington Township. He paid \$7.50 costs.

Jack Guida, 24634 Hass, Dearborn, was charged with passing on a hill on US-16 in Farmington Township. Guida had 10 other tickets in 18 years of driving, and paid costs of \$7.50.

SCHOOL COACHES WILL RECEIVE INSTRUCTION
