

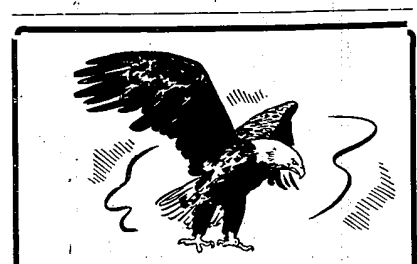
LIVONIA SCOUTS RETURN HOME FROM CAMP TRIP

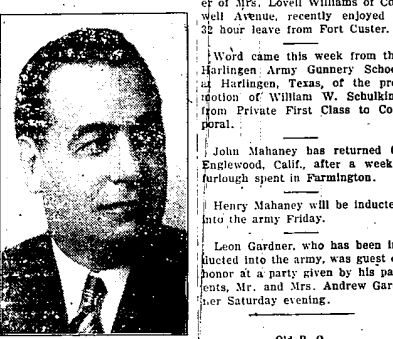

CLYDE UNDERWOOD IS CANDIDATE FOR PROSECUTOR



Clyde D. Underwood, well known Pontiac Enterprise, announces he will be a Republican Candidate for Prosecuting Attorney at the September 15th primary election.

Mr. Underwood was Prosecuting Attorney for two terms from 1925 to 1929 and is well acquainted with the duties of the office. His education was obtained in the Pontiac Schools, The University of Detroit, and The Detroit College of Law from which he was graduated. He was admitted to the practice of Law in 1919 and privately practiced law for one year. He was then selected by A. Floyd Blackstone as his first assistant in the prosecutor's office, a position he retained for four years. He was elected Prosecutor and re-elected after his first two years. During his years as Prosecutor Mr. Underwood was called upon to prosecute many cases involving major crimes. At the end of his second term he declined renomination and voluntarily returned to the private practice of law in which he is now engaged.

When the Pontiac one-man Grand Jury was demanded by the City Commission last September, Mr. Underwood was named by Judge Charles P. Webster to assist in the examination of witnesses. About the same time he was named a special assistant. Attorney General to enable him to handle Grand Jury trials without any question being raised as to his legal right to prosecute such cases.

Mr. Underwood believes a more vigorous and impartial enforcement of the criminal laws is needed in Oakland County and closer co-operation brought about between the Prosecutor's office and other law enforcing offices. Mr. Underwood is a member of the Elks, American Legion and the All Saints Episcopal Church.

- (1) Empty the dust bag frequently. (It's a good idea to do this every time you use the cleaner.) Once a month, turn the bag inside out and brush it thoroughly. Do not wash the bag.
- (2) Keep brushes free from hair and threads.
- (3) Before cleaning your rugs, pick up by hand all hairpins, nails, tacks and other metal objects that might damage the cleaner. These can cause bag-punctures, belt-cuts, or even get tangled up in the fan.
- (4) See that the nozzle and brush are properly adjusted. (Improper adjustment may break the rubber belt, and new rubber belts are becoming increasingly hard to get.)
