(2) Keep brushes free from hair and threads.

(3) Before cleaning your rugs, pick up by hand all hairpins, nails, tacks and other metal objects that might damage the cleaner. These can cause hipmetures, belt-cits, or even get tangled up in the fax.

(4) See that the nozzle and brush are properly adjusted. (Improper adjustment may break the rubber belt, and new rubber belts are becoming increasingly hard to get.)
