NEW GUINEA—MacARTHUR FRONT LINE



New Guinea is the huge island that today forms Australia's first and commands the shortest line of supply from the United States to General MacArthur's forces in Australia. New Guinea's importance to the Allies in the southwest Pacific is told in these maps—the larger one showing the New Guinea terrain close-up, while the circuitous one gives its relation to the entire southwest Pacific problem. Japan's four attempts to take New Guinea and springboard to Australia, 100 miles across Torres Strait, have thus far failed.
