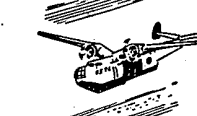

COMMITTEE WILL ASSIST IN FILLING BLANKS

The Oakland County Farm Transportation Committee, recently appointed by the Oakland County USDA War Board, will be available to assist farmers who own trucks and truckers who haul farm products from farms and supplies to farms in executing applications for "Certificates of War Necessity" which all trucks are required to obtain before November 15, according to Walter R. Cook, Chairman of the Oakland County USDA War Board.

The dates, October 22, 23 and 24, have been designated as National Farm Truck Registration Days, Mr. Cook said, and on one of these three days all farmers in Oakland County who own trucks and all truckers in Oakland County who service farmers should obtain assistance in filling out necessary application blank from the County Farm Transportation Committee.

Under General Order No. 21 issued on September 9 by the Office of Defense Transportation, all trucks must carry a "Certificate of War Necessity" in order to legally operate, and in order to obtain gasoline, tires or repair parts after November 15.

Mr. Cook said that "Certificate of War Necessity" aims to continue truck operations to those which are necessary to the war effort and to essential domestic requirements to make the most possible use out of each truck. To this end, the certificates will set the maximum mileage and the minimum loads for each truck or vehicle for which a certificate is issued.

The ODT is now mailing application blanks to all truck owners. Mr. Cook said. Any truck owner who does not receive an application blank previous to this registration may obtain one by writing to the nearest ODT field office, located in Michigan at Cadillac, Saginaw, Detroit, Lansing and Grand Rapids.

Mr. Cook, who serves as chairman of the County Farm Transportation Committee, said that the following were members of the committee: Cyril Oliver, West Bloomfield township farmer; Joseph Long, Commerce township farmer; George Perry, livestock dealer of Clarkston; and George Hamlin, farm supply and implement dealer of Pontiac.
