



ARMY ENGINEERS NEED CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES

College graduates with approximately five (5) years experience with steel or steel construction are needed by the U.S. Engineers in the construction of new locks at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. The duties will consist in checking steel as it arrives, inspecting assembly of steel on job or in plant and rejecting inferior materials or workmanship. Must have experience, too, in electric welding or background for quick learning of same. The base pay will be \$2800 per annum. The base pay will be generally, will be for the duration of the war and in no case will extend more than six months beyond the war.

The U.S. Engineers are also seeking men with two years college engineering, or equivalent experience in building construction, requiring the sinking of timber piles and/or sub structure caissons, to serve as inspectors of timber pile driving at Escanaba, Michigan. The base pay will range between \$2000 and \$2600 per annum. The appointments will be for a period of from six to nine months.

These employment opportunities are not open to those liable to early induction into the Armed Forces by reason of high classification under the Selective Service Act, or those presently debarred because of corrective physical conditions or dependency circumstances which would justify the reasonable assumption that they may soon be reclassified and inducted. No one NOW engaged in war work will be considered unless these positions require the use of higher skills than they are NOW using in their present employment.

RED CROSS NOTES

Increased interest was noted today in the Home Nursing Program being taught by the American Red Cross. More than 1200 women in Oakland County are now attending these classes in twenty-three communities.

Local physicians have given ready endorsement to the Red Cross Nursing program. This is a definite need for this training in protecting the health of the civilian population during wartime. This need is urgent at the present time, as so many doctors are answering the call to the armed forces. Women with home nursing skill the heavily overburdened doctors remaining on the home front by treating their families' health problems.

The Red Cross Home Nursing Course prepares women to care for illness at home, under doctor's supervision when required. Care of babies, children and adults, and prevention treatment of the various diseases are stressed.

Sixty-four classes are underway throughout the county. Volunteer registered nurses instruct these home nurses in the following localities: Avon township, Auburn Heights, Berkley, Birmingham, Clawson, Clarkston, Drayton Plains, Ferndale, Farmington, Hazel Park, Holly, Huntington Woods, Leonard, New Hudson, Lake Orion, Oxford, Pontiac Township, Rochester, Royal Oak, Southfield, Seymour Lake and Westford.
