QUARTERMASTER CORPS NEEDS INSPECTORS

The Quartermaster Corps of the War Department is in urgent need of eligible applicants to fill inspectorship positions. These employment opportunities are open to men 25 years of age and over who are not liable to early induction into the Armed Forces by reason of high classifications under the Selective Service Act, or dependency circumstances such as would justify the reasonable assumption that they may soon be reclassified and inducted. No one NOW engaged in war work will be considered unless the position for which they are applying is for the use of higher skills than they are NOW using in their present employment. Applicants must have at least four years of inspecting or testing experience or SUBSTITUTION experienced training as determined by the appointing officer as adequate for proper performance of duties. Ability to read blueprints is a fundamental requirement.

Duties will consist of inspecting wood products at contractors' plants for compliance with government specifications, maintaining records of production, originating receiving reports and making shipments on government bills of lading.

Applicants must possess ability and personality to deal successfully with military leaders, enlisted men and officials of the contracting firms. Base pay is \$2000 per year. The work requires considerable traveling with allowance per diem plus transportation. Points of departure will be for the duration of the tour.

COUNTY CHAIRMAN ADVISES FORMING "CAR CLUBS"

All autoists who expect to apply for supplemental rations to enable them to drive to and from work should make plans now to share rides with others needing transportation to their jobs. A. J. Diebel, Chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, declared today.

"Car sharing has been made an integral part of the mileage rationing program because it is the most effective means of providing essential transportation on a minimum amount of rubber," said Mr. Diebel. "To get more than the basic A ration a car owner must form a car-sharing club to carry at least three other persons to and from work, or prove that he cannot do so."

The club must be formed before the application for a supplemental ration is submitted to the board. In fact, signatures of all members must appear on the application, and applicants must certify that they will carry through their part in the car club agreement.

The basic books will provide mileage for 210 miles per month. If the person to whom the ration is issued intends to use his car for occupational driving provided in the A book, Secondly, they will need to show that they have formed a car club. If they do not form a club, they must prove they cannot do so, and that alternative means of transportation are inadequate.

Applicants for supplemental rations will first need to prove that they need more than the 150 miles of occupational driving provided in the A book. Secondly, they will need to show that they have formed a car club. If they do not form a club, they must prove they cannot do so, and that alternative means of transportation are inadequate.

Mr. Diebel pointed out. "The board will decide whether the ration granted should be in the form of a "B" or a "C" book. The "B" book, in addition to the A book provides for a maximum of 470 miles of occupational driving a month. Mileage for more than 470 miles a month requires a C book. But only drivers performing services regarded as essential to the war effort or the welfare will be eligible for C rations."

Those drivers entitled to preferred mileage through C rations must meet the car sharing requirements, the same as other applicants for Supplemental rations, Mr. Diebel said.
