Thomas Jefferson liked to eat. In fact, one of his first acts when he became President in 1800 was to select a chef. One of the President's favorite dishes at this time was beefsteak which had been soaked in olive oil for two hours before it was cooked. The steak was always served with French fries — quite new to the American cuisine of the time. Jefferson's beefsteak was always crowned with sweet butter into which minced fresh parsley and the juice of 1/2 lemon had been mixed. Jefferson himself picked the steak, and sometimes supervised its cooking. But even more unusual, the President often spent as much as \$50 a day on food — a lot of money today, but a fabulous sum in his own time!

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HELPFUL HINT: Learn to cook by color. Something bright and something green at each meal make the meal much more appetizing to look at.

Teachers Ratify Pay Contract

Both adoption of a final 1971-72 school budget and a proposal to add non-voting student advisors to the Farmington Board of Education are on Tuesday night's agenda for a regular board meeting. Whether action will be taken on either matter is uncertain.

THE MEETING will be held in Middlebelt Elementary School, 24400 Middle Belt Road, beginning at 8 p.m. The curriculum report, a regular feature of board meetings, will be concerned with services offered by the Oakland Intermediate School District.

The board will meet in private session Monday night for a last minute look at school finances before Tuesday's public meeting. There is likelihood that one salary problem still remaining may have been

settled by that time. Negotiations have been moving forward with principals and other middle administrators who have joined for bargaining purposes into the Farmington Administrators and Supervisors Association (FASA) will ballot Jan. 26 in a state conducted election to be designated sole bargaining agent for the membership.

TEACHERS, meanwhile, voted overwhelmingly Wednesday to accept the contract reached earlier between their union, the Farmington Education Association, (FEA) and the board of education. The board ratified the agreement earlier.

The pact provides starting pay of \$8,200 in contrast to last year's \$8,000. Teachers with a bachelor's degree and 10 years' experience in the district are raised from \$13,200 to \$13,850. The maximum for teachers with master's degree goes from \$15,300 to \$16,175.

Meantime, principals and other middle administrators who have joined for bargaining purposes into the Farmington Administrators and Supervisors Association (FASA) will ballot Jan. 26 in a state conducted election to be designated sole bargaining agent for the membership.

A Michigan Employment Relations Commission hearing to determine the unit's composition resulted in exclusion of the superintendent, assistant superintendent and directors of personnel, elementary, and special education.

little about drainage and could make changes in site plans which would run contrary to the engineers.

Cairns suggested that the authority to approve site plans be delegated to the building department, except for larger projects which would go before the planning commission.

Stader said township employees were busy, and foulups would occur because employees lacked sufficient job time to do the detailed checks the planning commission or zoning board were capable of performing.

The planning commission meets three times a month, he added, and it's cheaper to have commissioners review site plans than to pay township employees.

Teeples expressed concern about undue delays and said he felt site plan approval

should be made the normal activity of the building department.

BRENNAN suggested a site plan review committee of the building department director and four planning commissioners which would meet periodically in business hours.

Brennan added that such questions as traffic flow and location of driveways are site plan questions which require review by someone other than engineers.


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
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
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
