A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was held on January 3, 1972. Meeting called to order at 8 p. m. by Mayor Brotherton. ROLL CALL: Allen, Brotherton, Seibert, Allen. AYES: Brotherton, Seibert, Allen. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Richardson, Yoder. RESOLUTION DECLARED ADOPTED JANUARY 3, 1972. CITY OFFICIALS: PRESIDENT: City Manager, Dean Clark Britton, Attorney Kelly, Chief Deadman. ALTERNATE: Director Jones. PUBLIC HEARING: 14-17 REVIEW SPECIAL ASSESSMENT ROLL PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENTS NORTH SIDE OF THOMAS STREET Mayor Brotherton opened the Public Hearing and stated that notices of said hearing had been published in the local papers. He asked for comments from interested persons. Motion carried, all ayes. 14-18 REVIEW SPECIAL ASSESSMENT ROLL PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENTS NORTH SIDE OF THOMAS STREET On lot 6 the owners of the Frederick Building will have to construct additional parking space for seven cars, so there will be parking for approximately twenty cars in this area. In addition there will be the acquisition by the City of a small building next to the bakery, which will be eliminated in order to produce parking for an additional four or five cars. In essence, there will be parking for twenty-five cars for the comments on the Grand River Avenue and the funeral home on Farmington Road. The cost of this project will amount to approximately \$18,000, with a \$30,000 per front foot against the property owner. Hearing no further comments, motion by Seibert supported by Allen to close public hearing. Motion carried, all ayes. Motion by Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: RESOLUTION NO. 3 WHEREAS, the City Council has authorized the City Assessor to prepare a Special Assessment Roll for the purpose of defraying the cost of constructing street improvements in the City consisting of off-street parking lot improvements; AND WHEREAS, said Special Assessment Roll has been prepared and filed with the City Clerk and presented to the City Council; AND WHEREAS, said Special Assessment Roll has been prepared; AND WHEREAS, the City Council has met and reviewed said Special Assessment Roll and is satisfied with said roll; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: 1. The City Council hereby determines that it is satisfied with said Special Assessment Roll and that the assessments are in proportion to benefits received. 2. Said Special Assessment Roll which shall be Roll No. 71-51 and which in the sum of \$18,000 is hereby confirmed as prepared by the Assessor presented to the City Council on July 1, 1972. 3. Said Special Assessment Roll shall be divided into ten (10) equal annual installments, the first installment to be due on July 1, 1972 and the second and subsequent installments to be due on July 1st in each and every year thereafter. 4. The deferred installments of said Special Assessment Roll shall bear interest at the rate of not to exceed a maximum of 8 1/2% per annum from July 1st, 1972 to their respective due dates, said interest to be paid on the due date of each annual installment. 5. Said Special Assessment Roll shall be placed on file in the office of the City Clerk and the City Clerk is hereby directed to attach her warrant to a certified copy of the same within ten (10) days commanding the Assessor to spread the various sums and amounts appearing thereon on the Special Assessment Roll and upon the tax rolls of the City in the annual installments as herein provided for. CM-141-72 DRIVE ROAD "B" DEEP STRENGTH ASPHALT PAVING HEARING ON NECESSITY Mayor Brotherton opened the Public Hearing and stated that notices of said hearing had been published in the local papers. He asked for comments from interested persons. City Manager Dineen stated that last summer the City anticipated the need of having Drake Road widened to 22 ft. and incorporated in the gasoline tax proposal. However, the traffic flow did not warrant this and therefore the Oakland County Road Commission denied the request. City Manager Dineen said that the City had decided on an alternate proposal which actually is a two phase program. The first phase would be to give Drake Road an asphalt base with a "B" deep strength asphalt slab, 22 ft. wide that would have a life expectancy of 20 years. This would involve approximately \$40,000 and in trying to protect the cost of the City would assume 65% of the cost with the State and the other owners involved 70% per linear foot. Phase II would include the widening of the road to a later date with curb and gutter, and Drake Road would essentially be 3 1/2" of deep strength asphalt, and a width of approximately 31 feet. Present at the meeting and offering objections to the paving of Drake Road were: Elizabeth Brennan, 2955 Drake Road; Robert Tibby, 2835 Drake Road; Albert and Betty Hoin, 3253 Oakland; Robin D. Edwards, 24025 Drake Road; George Blom, 659 Payne, Dearborn. In favor of the proposed paving of Drake Road was Charles Duda, 3430 Oakland Avenue. Hearing no further comments, motion by Allen supported by Seibert to close public hearing. Motion carried, all ayes. Motion by Allen supported by Seibert to table this matter until the other two members of the Council were present, and the situation has been discussed by the entire Council, and perhaps some more residents who are involved in the proposed paving. Letter received from Michigan Municipal League stating that the State Legislative Workshop has been set for Thursday, February 17, 1972 commencing at 9:30 a. m. in the Old Plaza Hotel, Lansing. All members of the City Council are urged to attend. City Manager Dineen requested that those members of the City Council to plan to attend advise his office prior to February 1, 1972 and he will then advise Senator Purcell and Representative Baker that the Council will be there. He then advised a dinner work session to review proposed legislation and its effects on the City of Farmington. REPORTS FROM THE CITY CLERK REPORT TRAFFIC ENGINEER ANALYSIS OF LANDMARK RESTAURANT TRAFFIC STUDY City Manager Dineen reported that the City's traffic Safety Engineer, Mr. Jim Datta, has studied the report developed by Samuel A. Walker III, Traffic Engineer for the proposed Landmark Restaurant site at Grand River and Mayfield Avenue, and admitted by Mr. Walker at the Council meeting. The Traffic Safety Engineer, Mr. Datta, stated that the addition of 32 vehicles per hour during peak periods will not cause any appreciable traffic difficulties as far as roadway capacity is concerned, and it is his opinion that the additional traffic will not be a detriment to the capacity of the roadway near the intersection of Mayfield and Grand River. In view of the fact that the additional traffic will not be a detriment to the capacity of the roadway near the intersection of Mayfield and Grand River, the City Manager Dineen stated that this report would bring Council up to date at this point, and Council shall bid to meet with the Planning Commission and would not be making any decision on this until the next Council meeting on January 17, 1972. REPORT INCREASE WATER INSTALLATION AND METER CHARGES City Manager Dineen submitted a report from David J. Lyons, Director of City Services relating to recommendation for new schedule of fees for water taps and meters. The Director has had an opportunity to analyze our rate structure for water installations and meters and has recommended that as being charged by surrounding communities, and based on current expenses involved in making these water installations. Presently, the City of Farmington is charging \$25.00 for a 1/2" tap with an "B" meter remote read. Comparing that with the City of Livonia which charges \$250.00 and the City of Southfield which charges \$21.00 we find that we are considerably lower than the charges being levied by other communities. The City of Farmington established the rate of \$153.00 in 1968 and we believe the cost of materials and labor during this three year period has not increased. Motion by Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Effective February 1, 1972 Water Installation Charges will be as follows: 1/2" water tap with 3/8" x 1/2" remote meter \$28.00 1/2" water tap with 3/8" x 1/2" remote meter 23.00 1" water tap with 3/8" x 1/2" remote meter 27.00 1" water tap with 1/2" remote meter 30.00 All taps over 1" size shall be based on actual cost plus 20% overhead, and a sufficient deposit shall be placed with the Building Department prior to the installation of the tap. To change from standard meter to remote meter \$118.00 "A" meter set and inspection 55.00 "B" meter set and inspection 55.00 1" meter set and inspection 100.00 Meters larger than 1" in size shall be set at actual cost and 20% overhead. REPORT TURNBACK OF GRAND RIVER AVENUE FROM STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TO THE CITY OF FARMINGTON AND OAKLAND COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION City Manager Dineen reported that Michigan State Highway Department in 1968 stated they were going to turn back all the business routes on Grand River to the local jurisdiction since their primary function was to maintain the interstate expressways and these local business routes could be maintained better under the jurisdiction of local authorities. The City of Farmington entered into an agreement with the State to turn back Grand River Avenue and turn it over to Oakland County Road Commission. This acceptance was based on the promise that the State Highway Department would bring the road to proper condition before the turn back would be made. The Department of Public Services has had an opportunity to investigate the condition of Grand River Avenue and find that the majority of the surfaces throughout the City limits would be a resurfacing of "A" to "C" asphalt and several hundred feet of existing curbing would be replaced. The height of curbs would be reduced to 1" - 2" if they were constructed or had deteriorated through spalling of the concrete surface. Secondly, there are certain areas of pavement that would be replaced or reduced because of expansion, rising of the surface that could not be remedied with asphalt resurfacing. City Manager Dineen stated that in addition a recommendation was going to be made that the State Highway Department increase the number of lanes from Gill Road to Halsted Road, from the existing three lanes to a minimum of four lanes, and possibly five lanes for the entire length of Farmington. Presently, the three lane condition is a great traffic hazard. The City Manager told the Council that although the City of Farmington would not have the responsibility of jurisdiction of Grand River Avenue throughout the city limits, the City has a responsibility to residents to

make this main artery throughout the community brought up to proper standards. City Manager Dineen will be coordinating with Oakland County Road Commission officers in an effort to coordinate the need for improvements to the road prior to its official turn back to the City, who will have jurisdiction of the Oakland County Road Commission. The City Manager stated he would keep the City Council advised on this matter. RECEIVED AND FILED CM-141-72 REPORT REMOTE METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM City Manager Dineen reported that the City entered a policy of requiring remote outside reading dials for all new residential water customers about four years ago. Presently there are 2900 inside meter accounts and 200 remote meters for a total number of residential accounts of 500. It is quite obvious that for the City to standardize on remote outside reading dials for residential customers a more positive program would have to be enacted rather than just having all new residential water customers. In discussion with the Director of Public Services, the City Manager is of the opinion that a replacement program could be established on a four year basis for a total number of residential accounts of 500. It is his opinion that this can be increased in efficiency by 50% it would reduce this to 12 man days reading time per quarter, or the City would save approximately \$10,000 per year through the use of this system. City Manager Dineen stated he was of the opinion this would be another Farmington "first" and one of the only commitments in the State of Michigan to standardize on remote outside reading dials to improve efficiency to provide convenience to customers, and efficiency and accuracy in connection with the meter reading function in the City of Farmington. City Manager Dineen plans on submitting this proposal to the Six Year Capital Improvement Committee for their review and recommendation through the Planning Commission in the adoption of the Six Year Capital Improvement Program which will be used as a guide for the preparation and adoption of the Water and Sewer Account. Motion by Allen supported by Seibert that the Council go on record as being in favor of this approach to the concept of outside reading dials for water customers in the City of Farmington. Motion carried, all ayes.

CM-141-72 REPORT OAKLAND COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION MAINTENANCE CONTRACTS City Manager Dineen reported he is in receipt of a request from the Oakland County Road Commission that the City of Farmington execute county primary roads with the City of Farmington for the year 1972. The three types of the proposed contract are: 1. The City of Farmington to reimburse for Farmington Road from Eight Mile to Grand River, a distance of 17.0 miles at \$4120 per mile. \$70,120. Motion by Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The City of Farmington enter into a Maintenance Agreement with the Oakland County Road Commission for maintenance of Farmington Road from Eight Mile to Grand River, a distance of 17.0 miles at a cost of \$4120 per mile per year for the year 1972, and that Mayor Wilbur V. Brotherton be authorized to sign this agreement on behalf of the City of Farmington. ROLL CALL: AYES: Allen, Brotherton, Seibert. NAYS: None. ABSENT: Richardson, Yoder. Elizabeth Brines, City Clerk

CM-142-72 ESTABLISHMENT OF POSITION OF LIEUTENANT, PUBLIC SAFETY DEPT. City Manager Dineen reported that an occurrence was made on January 1, 1972 in connection of transferring the supervisory staff in the Public Safety Department, the Department Director, Robert F. Deadman, has selected the most qualified candidate for this position, Sgt. Daniel A. Brown, as the new Lieutenant of the Public Safety Department. This new position is designed to place the Traffic Safety Bureau and the Patrol Bureau under the command of the Lieutenant who will be in charge of the Operations Division. The Lieutenant will act as the Department Commander in the absence of the Director, which has been a deficiency in supervisory structure in the past. Presently, there are six positions in the Public Safety Department which are vacant and it was found it did not properly delegate responsibility. The Director of Public Safety has recommended a 5.4% differential from the present salary scale for supervisory staff. The proposed salary would be \$13,870 to \$14,320 at the end of the first year. This would give the same percentage differential between the lieutenant and sergeant and sergeant and lieutenant and that fall in the proper perspective within the City pay plan. Motion by Allen supported by Seibert to adopt the following resolution: BE IT RESOLVED THAT: That the Farmington City Council approve the establishment of the position of Lieutenant for the Public Safety Department effective January 1, 1972 and authorize a salary range of \$13,870 to \$14,320 for the first year. CM-143-72 REPORT MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY REVENUES AND EXPENSES ESTABLISHED YEAR 1971 The City's General Fund has received the Major Street Fund \$121,731.87 and our Local Street Fund \$7,270.49 for gross expenses involved in the 1971 calendar year operation of the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund. This was primarily due to the fact that the Oakland County Road Commission has not yet received its 1971 budget and a temporary advance was made. City Manager Dineen told the Council it was proposed to adopt a resolution establishing these two amounts as a temporary advance to the Highway Fund with anticipated reimbursement prior to the end of the fiscal year June 30, 1972. Motion by Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: BE IT RESOLVED: WHEREAS: The Motor Vehicle Highway revenues were insufficient to cover expenditures for the calendar year 1971; and THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That temporary advances of \$121,731.87 to the Major Street Fund and \$7,270.49 to the Local Street Fund be made from the General Fund

RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES RESOLUTION DESIGNATING NATIONAL BANK OF DETROIT AS PAYING AGENT ON BONDS Mayor Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmington has heretofore adopted certain resolutions for the purpose of making street improvements in the City of Farmington; AND WHEREAS, during the course of such proceeding Special Assessment Roll No. 71-49 was confirmed by resolution adopted June 21, 1971, with interest on the unpaid balance of the special assessment roll to be charged at eight and one half per cent (8 1/2%) per annum commencing on September 1, 1972; AND WHEREAS, bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of the unpaid special assessments were sold by the City at public sale on December 20, 1971, bearing an effective interest rate of 8 1/2% per annum; AND WHEREAS, Act 342, Public Acts of 1969 as amended, provides that the interest rate on the special assessment roll may not exceed one per cent (1%) per annum of the average net rate of interest borne by the bonds in anticipation of the collection of the assessments; AND WHEREAS, it is deemed reasonable and proper to amend the previously adopted resolution of June 21, 1971 to provide for compliance with the above statute; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: 1. The aforesaid resolution of the City Council adopted June 21, 1971 be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: "Said installments on said special assessment roll shall bear interest at the rate of one and eighty hundredths per cent (1.8%) per annum from the date of said resolution to the date of the collection of the assessments." 2. Said interest to be payable annually on the due date of the principal amount of said special assessment roll. 3. Motion by Seibert supported by Allen to adopt the following resolution: BE IT RESOLVED: That the City Council of the City of Farmington has heretofore adopted certain resolutions for the purpose of making street improvements in the City of Farmington; AND WHEREAS, during the course of such proceeding Special Assessment Roll No. 71-50 was confirmed by resolution adopted June 21, 1971, with interest on the unpaid balance of the special assessment roll to be charged at eight and one half per cent (8 1/2%) per annum commencing September 1, 1972; AND WHEREAS, bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of the unpaid special assessments were sold by the City at public sale on December 20, 1971, bearing an effective interest rate of 8 1/2% per annum; AND WHEREAS, Act 342, Public Acts of 1969, as amended, provides that the interest rate on the special assessment roll may not exceed one per cent (1%) per annum of the average net rate of interest borne by the bonds in anticipation of the collection of the assessments; AND WHEREAS, it is deemed reasonable and proper to amend the previously adopted resolution of June 21, 1971 to provide for compliance with the above statute; AND WHEREAS, the Official Notice of Sale provided that the paying agent for said bond issue was to be designated by the purchaser, subject to the approval of the City Council; AND WHEREAS, the purchase of said bond issue designated National Bank of Detroit, Michigan, to be the paying agent for said issue; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: 1. The aforesaid resolution of the City Council adopted June 21, 1971, be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: "Said special assessment roll shall bear interest at the rate of one and eighty hundredths per cent (1.8%) per annum from the date of said resolution to the date of the collection of the assessments." 2. The City Council of the City of Farmington, Michigan, hereby approves the designation of National Bank of Detroit, Michigan, as the paying agent for the \$22,500.00 City of Farmington Special Assessment Roll Improvement Bonds (Districts No. 71-49 and 71-50), dated November 1, 1971. 3. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution be and the same hereby are rescinded. ROLL CALL: AYES: Seibert, Allen, Brotherton. NAYS: None.
