INFORMATION RELEASED ON INCOME TAXES

In order that taxpayers may be able to determine in advance what their probable tax liability will be on March 15, 1943, this is the first of a series of brief articles devoted to a summary of the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1942.

Individual Income Taxes
The normal tax rate is increased from 4 per cent to 6 per cent and this rate is applicable to net income minus personal exemption, credit for dependents, earned income credit, and any credit for interest on obligations of the U.S. and its instrumentalities.

The surtax rates start at 13 per cent on the first dollar of surtax net income (net income less personal exemption and credit for dependents) and graduate up to 82 per cent on any amount over \$209,000.

For taxable years beginning after December 31, 1942, a 5 per cent tax known as the Victory tax will be imposed on individuals having an annual gross income of more than \$24,412 per week.

This is in addition to the regular income tax. To provide for the payment of this tax in the case of employed persons (including public officials and elected officials), 3 per cent will be withheld at the source on all compensation in excess of \$12 per week.

Exempted from withholding are wages paid for farm labor, military or naval service, casual labor, domestic services and services outside the United States. Withholding is not applicable to professional fees, interest, or dividends.

No distinction in assessing the Victory tax is made between married persons and single persons, but in addition to the specific exemption of \$24,412 credits are allowed for the payment of life insurance premiums, amounts paid for the liquidation of indebtedness, and purchases of U.S. bonds or other approved U.S. obligations.

A post-war credit is allowable, amounting to 25 per cent of the tax for single persons and 40 per cent for married persons, plus 2 per cent for each dependent, but not to exceed \$100 for each dependent. The post-war credit will be reduced by the amount of credit allowed in any taxable year.

The personal exemption for single persons is reduced to \$500 and that for married persons to \$1,200. The credit for dependents was reduced from \$400 to \$350. An additional exemption of \$200 for single persons and \$300 for married persons is allowed in cases of the armed forces below the grade of commissioned officers.

A new deduction is allowed for medical care (including payments for health and accident insurance) for the taxpayer, his wife and dependents. The part of such expenses which is deductible is that which exceeds 5 per cent of the net income, but does not exceed \$2,500 for a husband and wife filing a joint return, or a head of a family, and \$1,250 for a single person.

Deduction is allowed to purchasers paying state or city sales taxes even though they are not imposed by state law directly upon the purchaser. This deduction is governed by Section 122 of the Revenue Act of 1942.

As a result of reduced personal exemptions, married persons having a gross income of \$1,200 or over and single persons having a gross income of \$500 or over are required to file an income tax return. The former requirement that the return be made under oath is eliminated.
