"Toothache Pig" Goes to Dentist
The story of Vermont's "toothache pig" has reached the department of agriculture. There are 250 teeth in the Charles Flint family of Thetford, Vt., and they receive a dentist's attention as needed because of that pig.

Each year Flint, who is a Farm Service administration borrower, raises a litter of pigs. One he gives to Dr. J. W. Sowles, a dentist at Randolph. In return Dr. Sowles provides all needed dental attention to the Flint family of eight.

Both parties are well satisfied with their deal. Flint figures it costs him about \$12 a year to raise the pig, including value of time spent in caring for the porker.

STATE CANDIDATE PRESENTS HIS POLICIES

Charles M. Ziegler, Republican candidate for State Highway Commissioner, today, made the following statement:

"I am elected State Highway Commissioner, the State Highway Department will be operated on an efficient and business-like basis and with trustworthy and courteous personnel. All persons hav-

ing business with the Department will find a friendly greeting and welcome at the Department's office at all times.

"I will not sanction the policy which has been practiced under the present highway department, namely, that of permitting employees to take part in political activities under the cloak of 'detached service'."

"It is the general opinion that civil service has meant little as far as the present highway department administration is concerned. If I am elected I will see that this Department conforms to the true spirit of civil service."

"Contracts will be awarded to the lowest bidder and a uniform high quality of work will be required. Highway locations will be designated on the basis of that which is best and most economical for the traveling public. Right-of-ways will be purchased on a fair and equitable basis, without regard to ownership and with favor shown to none."

"I will make no comment on pending legislation as that is solely the business of the Michigan Legislature."

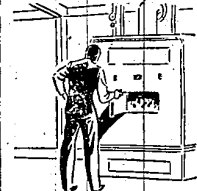
"I will make every effort to secure all possible Federal highway moneys for Michigan so as to properly take care of the transportation of war materials and manpower and to insure proper access to all plants engaged in producing vital war equipment and supplies. This will be done, however, with the insistence that Michigan must retain all responsibility for and control of its own highway system."

"To summarize, my purpose will be to run an engineering office, not a political machine as has been the case in that Department in recent years."

"I am prepared, in the face of decreasing revenues, to administer the Department to fit the public pocketbook drained by the war effort."
