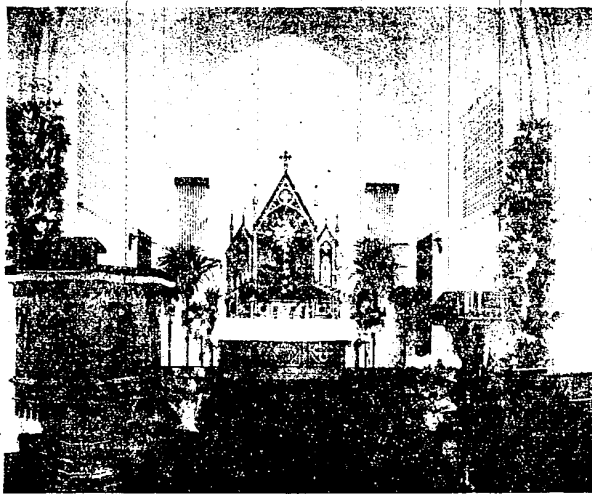

The Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church To Burn Mortgage on Easter Evening

Since last we met around the Cross of Christ and the glories of Easter, great changes have come over our land, as there have over nearly all lands. In the interim many have felt the very essence of Gethsemane. Some, who have found themselves in the garden of confusion, seeking Divine guidance, have found, as did Jesus, that the 'cup of sorrow' could not pass away untaken. All, who have come to the garden agonizing between two 'wills', have been directed in the Divine Will, which of necessity brought them directly to the very force of Good Friday. But here, facing the Cross, the picture of the two thieves revealed itself again. The one past the 'cup', so to speak, by his unwillingness to follow the will made known to him. By his self-will, arrogance, indifference, and coldness to the Saviour of man, he past the 'cup'. The other, who had no doubt past the 'cup' many times before, now in his last moment of decision realized the greater plan for man's life, "Not my will, but Thine be done," which led him to the humility which recognizes and reaches out to that something which is infinitely greater than self, "Lord, remember me when Thou comest into Thy kingdom."

And so from Gethsemane to the Cross many will come to the glory of Easter, "Because I live, you also shall live." "Today," immediately upon accepting Christ as the Saviour, "Shalt thou be with Me in paradise." Of necessity it will be through the Cross and the tomb that God, through His Son, will lead us to Himself; but the great glory of God comes in the fact that He is not to be found, like a mummy, in the tomb, dead, cold, and lifeless, because "He is not here, He is risen."

So it is that we come to the glorious Eastertide with joy, yet with deep humility of soul. For in this season we think particularly of all those men and women on the battle fields; we think of their desires and hopes for something much more noble than unnecessary death; and for us it remains to make that shed-

ding of blood nothing less than the establishment of peace and universal brotherhood. May all those who come to this Cross, not be left to no end, but come to know the power and glory of a risen Christ.

It is through the Church that the risen, living Christ is made manifest upon earth, for it is the 'body of Christ'. Therefore, it is more than passing significant that we give support to the Church with our effort, testimony and means.

No less than a triumphant faith has been revealed in Salem Church in that its members and friends have found it good; in so far as is possible, to insure her future significance, by putting their effort toward liquidating her present material indebtedness.

Salem Church, the older of the present Churches in Farmington, has since her erection in 1902, under the pastorate of the Rev. John Bollens, met many situations with a strong faith in her purpose. In the Fall of 1940 the Congregation undertook a program of alteration, decorating and rededication to beauty and holiness. This sort of program is of necessity expensive, and rightly so, for certainly a thing of beauty and holiness should be costly. This particular undertaking approached a cost of \$15,000.00; parts of which, in no small manner, were paid by individuals. However, an indebtedness of \$3600.00 remained. To this amount \$1200.00 was added in the erection of a garage and cement-work on the Church property.

The above indebtedness has been reduced each month in amounts required, but now the faith of the good people of Salem Church and friends are making it possible to have a Church free of debt. So it is with more than usual pleasure that the invitation is extended to all friends to be present in a Service of joy and Thanksgiving on Easter Evening at 8:00 o'clock. Also there is a hearty invitation extended to fellowship and dine with us at a dinner, which will be served at 4:30 p.m. on Easter Day.

We will enjoy your presence with us.

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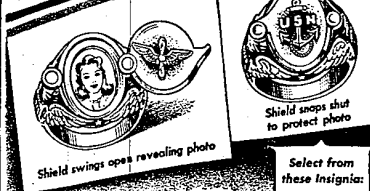
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
