BUY PLANT FOOD NOW TO ASSURE SUPPLY - FARMERS ARE TOLD

CHICAGO - The prudent farmer of yesterday, whose neighbors scoffed when he ordered his fertilizer early, will again be the smart operator this season, according to a statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. "Hitherto," says the statement, "many farmers waited until the last minute to determine their fertilizer needs, and they contacted their dealer, who had a truckload going to the factory, and deliver the plant food out in the field. The result was that business was concentrated into a feverish rush of three or four weeks in the spring. "The farmer who looked ahead, got his fertilizer early and put it in the barn to be sure of having it, was not so much of a sap but rather these accustomed to hurry-up service, because he had to handle his fertilizer twice. "But wartime labor shortages and transportation snags have changed all this. Now the farmer who waits to order his fertilizer until he is actually ready to plant his crop faces the probability of not getting any supplies at all because of helplessness at fertilizer factories and the overburdening of truck lines. Unless the fertilizer tonnage moves early this year, and in heavy volume the fore part of the season, bottlenecks may develop that will seriously hamper the flow later. "The situation is more complex this year, too, because necessary regulations have had to be devised by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to conserve the supply of war-scarce chemical nitrogen and allocate it first to crops most essential to wartime food, fat and fiber production. Each farmer buying fertilizer is required to fill out an application form stating his crop plan, his previous use of fertilizer and his 1943 needs. 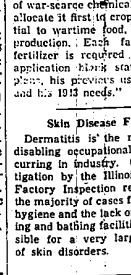
