SWEET AND FANCY



Michigan State Apple Commission

Could anything be prettier than a fluffy chiffon pie . . . particularly when you know it's made of sweet, juicy Michigan apples and set in a graham cracker crust? Any woman who enjoys making "extra special" dishes will want to use this recipe. You'll need . . .

1 cup cold water
1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 cup strained stewed Michigan apples
1/3 cup sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 eggs
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/4 teaspoon salt
Mix together boiling water, strained apples, sugar, salt, lemon rind and beaten egg yolks, and cook over boiling water until mix-

ture thickens slightly. Remove from fire. Soften gelatin in cold water. Add to hot mixture, stir until dissolved, and add lemon juice. Cool until it begins to thicken. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and pour into a graham cracker crust, and thoroughly chill.

Graham Cracker Pie Crust
(1 crust for 9 inch pie)
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1/3 cup powdered sugar
1/2 cup melted butter or oleomargarine
Crush graham crackers and mix with butter (or oleomargarine) and sugar. Pat mixture firmly into pie pan. Place pie pan in refrigerator or cold place. Allow to stand several hours, then fill.

LIVER BIRDS MAY APPEAL TO YOUR FAMILY

Necessity has proven to be the mother of invention and through necessity (diet rationing in this case) we home makers have had to try and present liver to our families in appealing and varied ways. This is good enough for company dinners and gives us the dressing we all get hungry for from time to time.

LIVER BIRDS
1 lb. pork liver
3 tbs. shortening
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper

Have butcher cut slices of the liver about 1/4 inch thick. Pour boiling water on the liver and let stand about ten minutes, then drain. Lay slices of liver out flat and press dressing with flat of the hand on each piece. Roll lengthwise, far end with a toothpick or tie with string. Roll in flour. Brown in shortening, preferably bacon drippings. Season with salt and pepper. Put liver birds in a casserole. Add 1/2 cup water to drippings in skillet and pour over birds. Cover and bake for one hour in 350 degree oven.

Dressing
3 tbs. shortening
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
4 cups stale bread cubes
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. poultry seasoning (or sage)
2 tbs. Chopped parsley

Melt the shortening, add onion and celery and cook until tender but not brown. Add all the other ingredients and mix well. If bread is very dry, a little water may be needed to moisten the dressing.

Keep Iron Clean
It's good housekeeping to keep your iron clean. It will last longer and you can do a better ironing job. Keep the iron dusted and the surface clean and smooth. Remove starch spots with a cloth wrung from suds. If this doesn't work try a mild scouring powder.

Man Is A Weaver—Elizabeth Chesley Baily. How exciting is the story of the lovely little Empress of China and her discovery of the secret of silk making; and how adventurous is the tale of the way the carefully guarded secret leaked out when two monks concealed eggs of the silk worm in their hollow walking sticks when they set out for their home in Byzantium! Add equally exciting are the romantic stories of all the other woven materials, from basket materials to nylon, which you will find in this intriguing book.

You will read of the island of Crete and how it became the fashion center of the ancient world; how the American Indians weave stories into their colorful blankets and cloth; how strange fibers are made today from spruce trees and

metals and minerals.

Altogether "many fascinating hours await you when you read about man and his weaving down through the ages.

Up and Down California—William H. Brewer. When in 1860 the excitement of the gold rush had somewhat subsided, Professor Brewer went with a surveying party to explore and to chart California. This expedition was one of the first attempts to establish the mining of the region on a systematic basis, and it was also the first scientific exploration of the territory. During the four years of the survey, Brewer kept a lucid record of the studies, discoveries and adventures of the party. He combines scientific comment, vivid description, and local anecdotes in a most entertaining manner, and his keen observation and rugged, invigorating style give flavor which is a delight to the reader.

Vegetable Gardening in Color—Dahiel J. Foley. This picture-cyclopedia of vegetables is just the kind of book that gardeners have long awaited. It is the first book to show all the important vegetables, herbs and berries in full color plates. They are conveniently arranged in alphabetical order with accompanying descriptions and complete cultural directions.

In addition to the color plates, there are numerous black and white photographs and line drawings that show well-planned gardens and many of the important gardening operations.
