War Booms Olive Industry In U. S.'s Sandy Southwest

The global war, stirring the world trade and driving Uncle Sam toward self-sufficiency, is booming the olive industry. Production of virgin or first-press oil from California's olives now is double the output of pre-war years.

New importance for America's olive industry does not mean world importance. Franciscan Fathers planted small groves near their San Diego mission 170 years ago, but the slow expansion to the present, 1,200,000 trees has been confined to California, with a tiny overflow into Arizona. Only in that corner of the country is the warm climate and dry, sandy soil of Mediterranean lands matched. California's groves, however, normally provide only about one five-hundredth of the world output of olive oil.

Olive trees reach full bearing maturity in seven years or more. The doubling of domestic oil production was achieved by diverting a much larger part of the crop from packing. As neither trees nor wars can be rushed for the convenience of appetites, Americans must grin and bear present domestic yields that are only a small fraction of the 50 million pounds of olives, 50 million pounds of edible olive oil and 30 million pounds of low-grade oil for commercial uses imported in 1940. Of the 125 million pounds of olives and olive oil imported in 1940, 57 million came from Spain, 50 million from Greece, 20 million from Italy and nine million from Portugal.

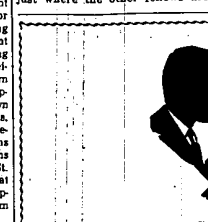
Corporal Henry Dhanke, Jr., has been transferred from Camp Bell at Niagara Falls, and is now stationed at Kears, Utah.

There's a lot of little towns around which aren't worth anything any more. But that's war.

There isn't much more to say now except that I'm hoping I can return to Michigan soon. The sooner the better."
