

TRY THIS RECIPE FOR SHERBERT ON A HOT DAY

Another nice hot weather dessert to be made in the refrigerator is Orange Cream Sherbert. It is inexpensive and the coffee cream may be substituted with top milk.

Orange Cream Sherbert
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/2 cup water
 Grated rind of 1 orange
 2 egg whites
 1 1/2 cups orange juice
 1 tbs. lemon juice
 1/2 cup coffee cream
 dash salt

Cook sugar and water slowly for ten minutes. Add grated rind to syrup and continue cooking for several minutes. Strain. Add syrup to fruit juices. Cool. Pour into freezing tray and allow to freeze firm. Remove mixture to chilled mixing bowl and beat until light. Add coffee cream and stiffly beaten egg whites to which has been added. Pour into tray and freeze. If ingredients separate, stir mixture again.

Try This Potato-Carrot Puff



A LITTLE jar of strained carrots sounds like something for the children, but combined with mashed potatoes and other ingredients, it provides the filling for fluffy Vegetable Puff. This potato-carrot dish, so very low in point value, will be a favorite with every member of the family. To serve four to six:

3 cups hot, seasoned mashed potatoes
 1 1/2 ounce jar strained carrots
 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
 1 teaspoon grated onion
 2 eggs, separated
 Melted butter or margarine

Beat together the mashed potatoes, strained carrots, parsley and onion. Add well beaten egg yolks and mix well. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into potato mixture. Lightly into a greased casserole. Brush top with melted butter or margarine. Bake in a moderate oven (375 deg. F.) 30 to 35 minutes, or until lightly browned. Top may be garnished with bacon slices.

The Dutch Shoe Mystery—Elery Queen. Abby Dorn, the richest and most famous woman in America, was about to undergo a delicate operation. The operation was to be performed at the hospital founded through her charitable bequests. The brilliant surgeon who was both her friend and protégé, in the quiet of the building, relatives, friends and enemies waited to learn the outcome.

The operating room was ready, the surgeon called for his patient, a door opened and a long, still form was wheeled in. The alert doctor bent over, lifted the sheet—and found Abby Dorn dead. She had been murdered only a few moments before, almost under their very eyes. That is the beginning of this amazing problem in deduction, and of the finest stories ever written by Elery Queen and one of the most baffling murder mysteries of modern times. Add before it is sold even Elery Queen was close to admitting that his brilliant mind was not sufficiently clever to match the mind of the murderer.

Fair Warning—Mignon G. Eberhart. When Dr. Blake told Marcia Godden that her husband was cured and that he would be coming home from the hospital that day, her first reaction was a suffocating terror. For marriage to Ivan Godden had changed her from a healthy normal girl to a white-faced, nervous, hunted-looking woman. She had been crushed and beaten down until her body, her initiative, and even her common sense weren't functioning as they ought to. She was afraid.

The first peace Marcia had known in the three years since her marriage had come during those three weeks when Ivan was in the hospital. It was horrible to think of, but she had prayed that he would not live to return. And Rob Copley, who lived next door and who was in love with her, kept begging her to leave Ivan, to escape from the cruelty and terror which marriage with Ivan meant, to marry him. She loved Rob, but she couldn't leave Ivan. To Marcia, marriage meant literally what the words of the ceremony said: "Till death do you part."

That night Ivan Godden was murdered. In the sinister brilliance of these pages await love and fear, faith and treachery, murder and detection. Here is another absorbing record of a desperate game whose stakes were life and death, written by an author whose books are best sellers not only in America and England but in a dozen foreign countries as well. "Fair Warning" is one of Mignon Eberhart's most exciting stories.

Adam of The Road—Elizabeth Janet Gray. "A road's a kind of holy thing," said Roger the Minstrel to his son, Adam. "That's

why it's a good work to keep a road in repair, like giving alms to the poor or tending the sick. It opens to the sun and wind and rain. It brings all kinds of people and all parts of England together. And it's home to a minstrel, even though he may happen to be sleeping in a castle."

And Adam, though only eleven, was to remember his father's words when his beloved dog, Nick, was stolen and Roger had disappeared and he found himself traveling alone along these same great roads, searching the fairs and markets for his father and his dog.

Here is a story of thirteenth-century England, so absorbing and lively that for all its authenticity it scarcely seems "historical." Although crammed with odd facts and lore about that time when jongleur folk to go on pilgrimages, "its scraps of song and hymn and jongleur's tales of the period seem as new-minted and fresh as the day they were devised, and Adam is a real boy inside his ratty striped surcoat." Follow him on the road and see the shifting throng: rich merchants, pilgrims with cockle shells upon their hats, farming folk driving pigs to the fair, noblemen with retinue, minstrels and priests, saints and thieves and honest country bodies, and somewhere in the crowd tall Roger the Minstrel, and Nick, a small red spaniel.

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4-H EXPOSITION WILL BE HELD NEXT WEEK

The 4-H Exposition will be held August 19th and 20th at the 4-H Farm on M-24, (3 miles north of Postville on Lagers Road).

4-H Club members will exhibit the results of their summer project work in livestock, gardens, crops, flowers, canning, and food preparation.

Miss Lola Belle Green, Assistant State Club Leader, Michigan State College, will judge food preparation and canning exhibits, and conduct the clothing judging.

Mr. Gordon Morrison, Plant Breeder of the Ferry-Morse Seed Farm will judge the gardens and crops. Livestock will be judged by Mr. Frank Williamson.

All club members interested are invited to participate in the clothing judging school on Thursday, August 19th at 11 o'clock, and the canning judging on Friday morning at 9 o'clock.

Demonstrations by club members will be given on canning, vegetable storage, quality egg production on the second day. There will be a livestock parade in the afternoon.

All parents and friends are invited to attend as much of the exposition as they wish. There is plenty of space for picnic lunches for those who want to spend the day.

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
