rendering allegiance to the pope.

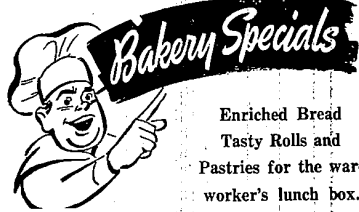
Battle Fought After War Ended

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REPORT OF ANNUAL SCHOOL BOARD MEETING DISTRICT NO. 9

The annual meeting of the Board of Education District No. 9 was held at the John Grace School Monday evening, July 12th, 1943.

The meeting was called to order at 8:20 p.m. by the president, Will J. Oliver. Other Board Members present were Ollie Kallman, Edwin M. Combs and Arthur Jayne. Roland Charpentier was absent due to work.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The treasurer gave a report on the receipts and disbursements for the year. Also the balances in the various bank accounts.

Under new business the election of three trustees was in order, the one unexpired year caused by the death of Mrs. Teach, and the three year terms of Will J. Oliver and Roland Charpentier, having expired.

Gus Meyner nominated Arthur Jayne to fill the one year vacancy. This was supported by George Combs. No other nominations. Elmer Hardow moved nominations be closed. Supported by Joe Doe. Carried.

George Combs and Gus Meyner were appointed tellers. Votes cast, 40. Arthur Jayne 35, one blank. Arthur Jayne duly elected trustee for one year.

Nominations in order for second trustee. Mrs. McNickle nominated George Combs. Claude Haskin nominated Gus Meyner. Mrs. Doris Brown nominated Claude Haskin. Mrs. Grace Combs nominated Joe Doe. Mrs. Pearl Perry moved nominations close. Supported by Sam Wilson. Carried.

The tellers, George Combs and Gus Meyner being nominees, new tellers were appointed, John Wilson and Gert Kallman. George Combs closed his nomination. Votes cast 41. Claude Haskin 21, Joe Doe 10, Gus Meyner 10. Claude Haskin duly elected a trustee for three years.

Nominations in order for third trustee. George Combs nominated Will J. Oliver, supported by Mrs. Lucy McNickle. No other nominations. Joe Doe moved nominations close. Supported by Mr. Ripaldi. Carried. Votes cast 38; Will Oliver 35, Joe Doe 2; blank 1. Will Oliver duly elected a trustee for three years.

After a lengthy discussion on the problem of transporting pupils to the Redford Union High School, Frank Cote made a motion supported by Mrs. Florence Meyner that the matter of transportation of pupils to High School be left to the Board. Carried.

There was also a discussion on consolidation. Edwin Combs gave a few facts and figures of several schools interested. Most of the people present seemed to favor his move.

A motion was made by Frank Cote supported by Mrs. Roland Charpentier the salaries of the Board of Education remain unchanged. Carried.

A motion by Frank Cote supported by George Combs the meeting adjourn. Carried.
