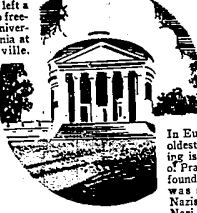

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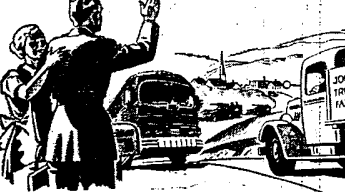
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Can You Picture MICHIGAN without Highways?

BATON ROUGE, LOUISIANA

As you approach the executive city of Louisiana the first building that becomes visible in the distance is the State House. Built under the administration of Huey Long, it's a beautiful building, very unlike the state buildings of other states which cling to the architecture of giant domes and pillars. Huey's state house is tall, slender and a thing of beauty. I call it Huey's state house. Actually, of course, it belongs to the state and its people. But it's pretty hard to disassociate Huey and the many improvements you find as you travel Louisiana. Free bridges span the rivers where heavy toll charges were the rule rather than the exception. You know Huey was the guiding light. Large signs hang at the entrance of the bridges to tell the driver that this bridge was "Built under the administration of Huey P. Long." Roads, schools, and many other institutions also felt the effect of his guiding hand. Say what you will about him, the State of Louisiana has profited much because he was its Governor and United States senator.

Few men have been hated as badly or loved as much. He definitely was a showman of the first water. His "share the wealth" plan was not practical but it made him a god in the eyes of the poor. He was hated and mistrusted by the rich and the highbrows in the political world. He asked no quarter from his enemies and evidently gave none. His methods were ruthless and to the extreme. He was a dictator in every sense of the word and like most dictators he accomplished some that was good and plenty that was bad. He died as he lived—in the thick of battle.

Just what place in history Huey will occupy is hard to tell, but one thing is sure, he won't be forgotten in this generation. Today as I stopped to gaze at his monument an old man approached me with his hat in his hand. His clothes were the garb of a man in the lower brackets of life. His hair was white as snow. He later told me he was 83 years of age. For some 15 minutes he recited a poem describing the glory that was Huey Long's. The old fellow spends a few hours each day at this self-imposed task and no visitor leaves until he has finished his recitation. The pittance he gathers enough to keep body and soul together, yet he is happy in his work. Others will probably take up his task when he passes on.

Today Huey lies buried on the State Capitol grounds. Few Governors have been given such honor but popular demand and Huey's political machine decreed he should have his final resting place near the State House he caused to be erected. The grounds are large and wonderfully landscaped. Huey rests near the center. A granite monument marks the spot, and atop the monument is a determined looking bronze statue of the Kingfish of Louisiana.

It is a beautiful place to spend eternity.

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TIMELY Tips



THAT SAVE ELECTRICITY

and are practical and patriotic!

YOUR REFRIGERATOR. Don't overcrowd your refrigerator or put hot dishes on the shelves to cool. Have refrigerator inspected periodically, and defrost regularly. Don't open door any often than necessary. Locate refrigerator away from heat sources.

YOUR RANGE. Use the deepwell cooker often—it's thrifty. Cook complete oven meals. Start your surface cooking on HIGH, then switch to LOW heat as soon as food comes to a full steam. Use very little water for cooking. Bringing large amounts of water to a boil wastes electricity. Foods should be steam-cooked (this helps conserve vitamins, too). On many electric ranges, cooking can be finished with stored heat from the surface units, after the current has been turned off.

YOUR OTHER APPLIANCES. Avoid overloading your electric washer. Do two washings instead of one, if need be. Don't run your washer longer than necessary—7 to 12 minutes per tubful is usually enough. If your electric iron hasn't a thermostat to control the heat pull out the plug when the iron is hot enough—and attach the cord again when additional heat is needed. This saves electricity. The same thing is true of your toaster—disconnect it when temporarily not in use, then plug it in again as needed. When baking or roasting in your electric cooker, don't waste heat by lifting the "cover" to "peek" at foods. The Detroit Edison Company.
