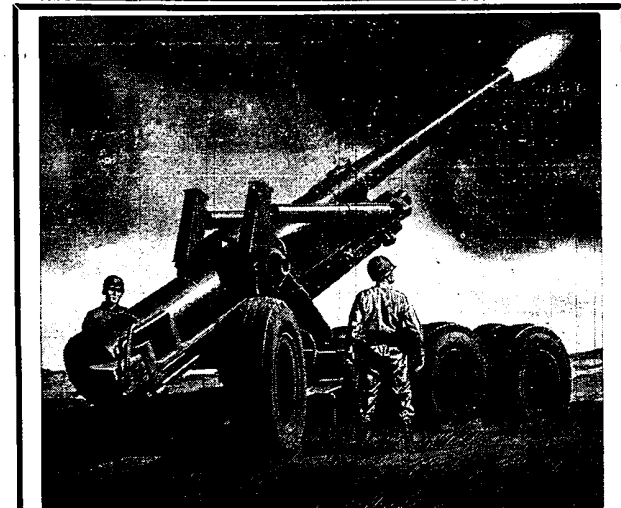
**Feet Hay**

**TRUCKS HELP BUILD SUPPLY ROAD**



**CLINTONVILLE, WIS.**—More than 350 trucks made here have helped in the almost unbelievable task of building the Alcan highway more than 1,600 miles through Canadian mountain and swamp wilderness to open a supply road for the U.S. Army from this country to Alaska. **Are Women Bum Drivers?  
Army Chieftain Says No!**  
It took a World war to bring the woman driver, maligned for her bumble-headed recklessness ever since the rattling age of the model-T, into her own.

"Women drivers are more careful than men," says Lieut. Raymond Notz who ought to know. Lieutenant Notz is the officer in charge of the Sixth service command garage at 1037 West Adams street, Chicago, and his army vehicles, from tiny jeep to lumbering truck, are operated by civilian women chauffeurs.

"I haven't found one complaint against the girls who drive the trucks," said Lieutenant Notz about the civilian members of his command who have taken over the duties of able-bodied soldiers, releasing them for duty in the battle zones. "Right now the caution of the careful driver is a form of patriotism. We, of the army transportation corps, have a rubber conservation program. A careful driver who doesn't have to stop suddenly is taking care of his tires. The girls do this instinctively."

"They're good workers," he said, "and they have pride in the job they do. We have an inspection every morning, stressing the condition of the tires. They examine their tires and report every blemish and little scar. Like everything else, tires last longer with good care. And these girls really handle their tires with care."

**Cup Paper Anniversaries**  
Despite an all-time marriage record in the United States in 1942, appropriate first anniversary gifts may fall to a new low! Couples celebrating the first anniversary—universal known as the "Paper Anniversary"—traditionally receive complete table sets in paper, tender anniversary parties and dinners in paper-tempting paper cups, containers, dishes, napkins and table cloths. Because paper cups are so essential to the war effort, on both fighting and war production fronts, many types are virtually unobtainable for First Anniversary purposes. It was pointed out. More than 1,800,000 marriages were solemnized in this country in 1942, topping the previous high of 1,678,000 marriages during 1941.

**CADET NURSE CORPS SEEKS STUDENT NURSES**

The U.S. Cadet Nurse Corps, recently authorized by the Bolton Act, is seeking a quota of 65,000 new student nurses this year. Corp members will attend any of the existing 1300 accredited nursing schools that meet requirements of the law. Courses are accelerated from the usual 36 months to 24 to 30 months.

Depending upon their rank, student nurses will be paid maintenance and monthly allowances of from \$15 to \$30 by the school of nursing or hospital. The schools, in turn, are reimbursed by the U.S. Public Health Service of Federal Security Agency, which has been designated to administer the Bolton Act.

Upon graduation, students in the Corps may become registered nurses through the usual procedure required by the schools for graduation and after passing state board nurse examinations. In return for benefits received, members agree that, health permitting, they will remain in essential nursing service for the duration of the war, either civilian or military. They are not required to pledge themselves to military service only. Marriage is not prohibited, and an increasing number of nursing schools are admitting married students. Married nurses are also accepted by the Army Nurse Corps.

**Increases Cotton Acreage**
