## EDITORIALS

### Supporting Our Boys

We want to tell the people of Farmington and vicinity why they should invest as much as they possibly can in United States Defense Bonds.

Farmington and the country immediately surrounding, has sent approximately 500 boys and girls into the service of the United States. They are in the army, the navy, the marine corps, the WAC, and serving as nurses. They are fighting the battles of this country—of this community. Farmington has a vital interest in winning this war, the same vital interest that every other part of the country has in preserving the honor and integrity of America and safeguarding humanity for all time.

It costs at least \$1,000 a year to maintain a soldier, and if he is sent overseas, that amount should be doubled. Isn't that reason enough why we should cooperate in the Third War Loan Drive?

Of course we have already furnished the men, but just remember we are not doing the fighting. The boys are in the trenches and facing the storm of shot and shell on the battle fronts. We people of Farmington have something more to do, besides proudly waving our flags. We've got to help pay for keeping our boys at the front. They are making the supreme sacrifice. We are only required to make sacrifice in money.

Hold on a bit! Is it a sacrifice to buy a government bond? Not a bit of it! The only sacrifice is in using money that you have or money that you can get in the next few weeks and months to buy Bonds, the best in the world, which will pay you good interest on your investment.

Farmington will do her part all right. We know that. But let's do it quick, and reach the quota that has been given Farmington. Let's make a record that will put Farmington on the map!

### Call To Service

The glamour girls are gone from the covers of magazines this month. Have you noticed? In their places are girls in overalls with bandannas tight about their heads, or girls in well-worn uniforms or in every-day work clothes doing undramatic jobs that release men for active military duty!

All these publications didn't just happen to decide to have this kind of cover this month and to carry articles urging women to go to work. A request went out months ago of which this is the result. A request, mind you, not an order, as would have been the case in a totalitarian country, and all women's publications that have such a profound influence on feminine thinking rallied to the cause.

Every phase of American industry is on the job today, and American women are doing their share. They're putting the war first, eager to do whatever they can to speed the war effort and bring victory nearer.

It was comparatively easy to add three million women to the country's labor force in 1943, but to recruit a million more now that the cream is off the market will not be so simple. It will mean that women who have never had a job and never wanted one must go to work.

American women are finding this a time for soul-searching and serious thought, and the magazines of the country will make this thinking easier.

**No Dates On Kerosene Coupons**  
 Persons who use small amounts of kerosene for domestic cooking and lighting may now get renewal ratings for periods longer than the six months formerly permitted. This provision of a recent OPA amendment is to reduce the number of renewal applications by the consumer and the amount of paper work performed by the rationing board. This amendment provides that ratings issued for domestic cooking and lighting no longer will bear dates of issuance and expiration, and coupons may be used as long as they last. ## Looking Back Through The Enterprise Files

**TWENTY FIVE YEARS AGO (September 27, 1918)**  
 Reported Killed in Action  
 A story has been current the past week that Bartraw Groves, one of our boys to go to France with the first contingent sent over, has been killed in action. Nothing official has been received and we do not vouch for the truthfulness, sincerely hoping that some mistake has been made.

**Airplanes At Northville**  
 Word comes to us late Thursday afternoon that a flock of army airplanes visited the Northville fair yesterday afternoon, dropping Liberty Loan leaflets in advertising the coming sale.

**Ban Lifted**  
 The ban on Sunday gasoline will be lifted next Sunday for those wishing to buy bonds. This applies only for the purpose of the loan drive.

**TEN YEARS AGO (September 28, 1933)**  
 Opening Of Store Is Homecoming  
 One of Farmington's most popular merchants came back into his own Saturday, and all day long at Henry Pauline's new market the atmosphere resembled that of a homecoming of old friends. Opening up his new store with the most modern of fixtures and equipment, Mr. Pauline received congratulations from everyone on the appearance of the place.

**Works Program Ready**  
 Farmington's projected public works program with federal aid will be on its way to Washington next Tuesday morning, it is anticipated, with Monday night's meeting of the City Commission set for final approval of the plans as put in detailed form by the engineers.

**NRA Chairman Makes Appeal**

**FIVE YEARS AGO (September 22, 1938)**

A second log cabin, called the Big Duck, is used for serving of meals which are prepared by a housekeeper. Duck Island time is two hours ahead of Eastern Standard Time.

Gibb, the Ojibway, had built a soaring blaze in Salmon Glade, a secluded opening in the woods, about 25 feet from the river's edge and a short distance from Little Duck.

We were seated on a log facing the fire, with a long limestone slab for a table, when the "Governor" arrived. He had been walking glibly down the trail, alone, finding his way by the aid of a tall staff.

"Please remain seated," he said. Then he sat down with us and with the humility of a worthless beggar, asked a Divine blessing and voiced a fervent prayer for victory and peace and justice in a war-torn, weary world. It was the emotional cry of a man's soul.

A minute later, Osborn again became the bolterous, buoyant host, exploding retorts at George and Ethel and conveying tender affection to Stella and Gibb. He munched on six pieces of holland toast, topped with arrowroot cookies, and drank a quart of lemonade.
