

Powdery Mildew

There are many kinds of powdery mildew. One kind is found on roses, another on lilacs and still others on flowering currants, garden peas, ploxes, delphiniums and so on. Aging of the foliage and decline in plant vigor as summer advances produce conditions favorable for mildew infection. Other factors favoring mildew are high humidity, cool nights, heavy dews, and poor air circulation.

Cow Feed

When cows are on good pasture, one pound of grain daily for every five or six pounds of milk produced should be enough for the better producers; lower producers will require less. Farm grains alone will give excellent results while cows are on good succulent leaved pasture.

Most Canned Vegetable

The tomato is the top-ranking canned vegetable. Figures show that it leads all others in commercial canning.

Destroy Volunteer Plants

Scattered volunteer potato plants should be destroyed, as they are a good source of blight infection. Rotated or defective potatoes should be burned or buried deep so that they cannot grow to provide blight infection. To reduce blight damage of tomatoes, a heavy mulch which keeps the vines off the ground, may help. Staking of tomatoes helps in the same way.

Alcohol Uses

Alcohol is used for the production of smokeless powder, military anti-toxins, medicines, pharmaceuticals, explosive stabilizers, anti-freeze fluids, plastics, detonating agents, defolting fluids for aircraft and synthetic rubber.

Uses for Liners

One bale of cotton liners will make 20,000 rounds of machine gun ammunition. Civilian rayons are also made from liners and they serve as the basic part in the production of plastics.

WILL HIRE WOMEN TO DRIVE HIGHWAY BUSES

Now that hundreds of women have proven entirely capable of driving buses on the West Coast and in other war production areas, the National Association of Motor Bus Operators reports that major lines in all parts of the country are hiring women to pilot the highway streamliners.

The manpower shortage is bringing about the innovation even though men bus drivers are classed as essential workers because of their importance to the nation's war time transportation needs.

However, in spite of men who have entered the armed services, the bus companies are making certain that the public won't apply the epithet of "woman driver" to any of the new operators. What's more important, the enviable safety records of the industry must be maintained.

Women drivers already employed are handling the shorter intercity routes. They were selected from thousands of applicants through rigid examinations for physical fitness, driving qualifications, mental alertness, neatness and courtesy. Similar standards are being set up by all intercity bus lines, the association reports.

Before donning trim uniforms and taking up their war-essential work, the successful applicant are given intensive courses in actual bus driving by experienced driver-instructors.

Because the intercity bus industry was not in existence during the last war when similar manpower shortage problems were encountered, the employment of women drivers is really a new development and one that the operators accepted with some misgivings. The public has voiced no objections probably because riders are glad to have the bus come along, no matter whether a woman is at the wheel. The very few criticisms received come, oddly enough, from other women who seem to resent that one of their sex has qualified for the job.

Interfere With Breathing

Nicotine interferes with the normal supply of oxygen at high altitudes. When vegetable matter (such as tobacco) burns, a certain amount of carbon monoxide is formed. Carbon monoxide has a strong affinity for hemoglobin (the red, oxygen-carrying blood cells), consequently combines with them to the exclusion of oxygen. 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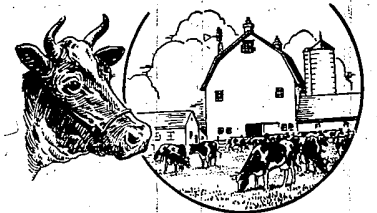
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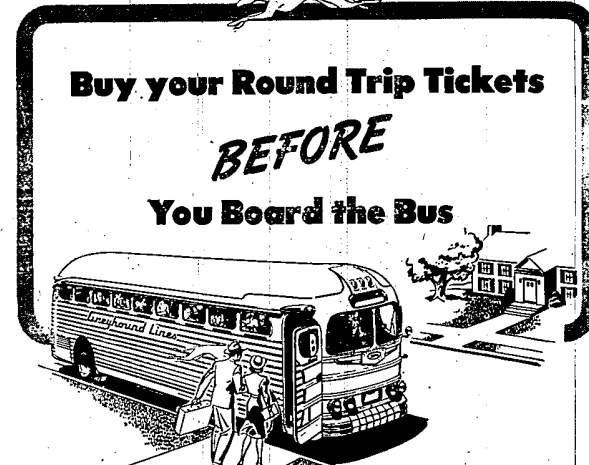
