Board Sets Military Academy NASB Trip To 'Frisco

Clarenceville School District taxpayers will be footing a \$3,776 junket by their board of education, which is planning to attend on mass the National School Board Assn. convention in San Francisco in April.

The junket is the one convention which the board allows itself on school funds each year, board members said. Accompanying the seven board members will be Supt. David B. McDowell.

According to McDowell, the schools will foot the bill for the eight round-trip coach fares (\$272 each) and give each person \$50 a day for the four days as expense money. Wives and companions accompanying the board members must pay their own way, the board said.
