FARM EQUIPMENT PROGRAM FAILS, MEETING TOLD

Members of the National Retail Farm Equipment Association were urged today to appeal to the Truman Committee to investigate the National Defense program, if necessary, to prevent a collapse of the farm equipment production program.

Discussing off the unscheduled discussion of the plight of the implement makers were two veterans in the industry, G. L. Gillette, vice-president of the Minneapolis-Moline Power Implement Co., and P. H. Noland, executive vice-president of the D. F. Avery Co. Both spoke from the floor of the convention at the Hotel Sherman, following the approval of a group of committee reports dealing with "The Road Ahead."

Gillette denounced widespread discussion of the plight of the implement makers by radio and other reports, following the allocation this spring of 900,000 tons of steel for an expanded production program and told the assembled dealers that in his opinion the supply situation would have to be straightened out. He said that machines would be available than in the year ending last June 30. Pointing out that under the controlled materials program the quarterly requirements for steel and other priority materials had to be filed in advance, Gillette went on to say that:

"If you get your CMP (filling for one type of steel cut down 25 to 50 per cent, it means that you have got to cut your whole production program accordingly."

The dealers, he said, will bear the brunt of the misinformation concerning the farm equipment program when they are called upon to explain to farmer customers why they can't deliver the machines that are now supposed to be in production.

His own company, Gillette said, is experiencing greater difficulty in getting vital supplies than at this time last year and this observation brought comment from other members of the audience that:

"It's because the 900,000 ton allocation carries an AA2 rating only, whereas the earlier quota carried an AA1 rating."

Another manufacturer suggested that "what isn't generally understood is that the 900,000 ton allocation is in the form of a hunting license. All it does is to allow the manufacturer to go out and hunt the material that's authorized."

Returning to the floor after Noland had related the troubles of the Avery Company in obtaining materials and parts, Gillette urged that "public opinion be aroused to see that the farm machinery production program goes through."

"Most of the members of the Truman committee come from districts represented by your membership," Gillette said. "If you can get word to them that manufacturers are not getting the materials to make farm equipment and that the program is breaking down, it may help. But the materials when granted have got to carry a high enough rating to have orders honored."

Keep Eggs Strong-Shelled
If oyster shell is not available for laying hens, limestone grit will take its place. Even ground limestone added to the mash will serve to keep the eggs strong-shelled.

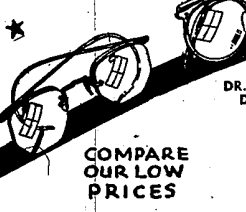
