**LIFE MEMBERS OF FARM CO-OP TO BE HONORED**

Members who have belonged to the Pontiac Production Credit Association ever since this local cooperative credit institution was organized nearly ten years ago, will be especially honored by their fellows at the 10th annual meeting of the association to be held in three sections as follows:

December 15, First Methodist Church, Howell, Michigan.  
December 16, YMCA Building, Pontiac, Michigan.  
December 17, Barrett Hotel, LaPeer, Michigan.

President Albert Luchman says there are 110 farmers who have been members ever since its organization, and 5 of them are directors at this time. Out of this group there are 7 farmers who helped to incorporate the association on December 20, 1933 and became charter members, the others having joined soon afterward. Special distinctive badges will be planned on the incorporators, and on the other 10 year members and it is planned to have them take a special part in the program.

Fred J. Beckman of Clarkston was also one of the incorporators and has served as secretary-treasurer of the Association since its organization. Other incorporators who are still active with the Association are: President, Albert Luchman of Washington; Vice-President, Smith Green of Waterloo; Director Harry J. Green of Washington; Emory D. Chapman of New Haven; Martin Montgomery of Richmond and H. Q. Apple of Romeo.

Plans are being made to serve dinner promptly at 12 o'clock noon, Eastern War Time, and the meeting will be called to order by the president at 1 p.m. The treasurer's report will show the number and amount of loans for the year, the membership, including the number of B-Stockholders who at present have loans; and the number of A-Stockholders who are continuing as members although they are not borrowing from the Association at this time.

In connection with the volume of business for the year, Luchman said the Association has loaned \$3,150,000 since it went into business, this amount having been borrowed by members to pay farm debts, make improvements and repairs, and to buy farm equipment, supplies and livestock.

There will be a drawing for door prizes just before adjournment at 3:30 p.m. and the honors to the 10 year members and some entertainment features, as well as the election of directors will take place in the afternoon.

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
