October 29, 1943  
Somewhere in Italy

I've been receiving the Enterprise off and on for quite a while, but it seems as though I couldn't find time to write to you to thank you for sending me the paper. I enjoy reading it very much.

The first thing I do is look at the service notes to see if there is anyone I know who is in the service and maybe over here where I am at, so that I could look them up and get together and talk over old times.

I've now been in the Armed Forces two years today and I've not met anyone from my home town. I have met a lot of fellows from Michigan and made good friends with them, and also from other states, but I haven't met anyone from Farmington.

On November 4, 1943, I will have spent seventeen months overseas which sure has been a long time and in that time I've seen quite a bit of country. I was in England for a short time, then I went to North Africa where I spent almost nine months, from there I went to Sicily and only spent a very short time and now at the present time I am somewhere in Italy. So you see, Editor, in that time I haven't met any of my friends I went to school with or chummed around with, but I've met a lot of outfits here and there and went to a lot of shows where different outfits have had shows for the service men, and still I didn't meet anyone I knew.

Again I would like to thank you very much for sending me the Enterprise. I enjoy reading it very much.

Private Robert H. Erwin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Erwin of 21325 Washington Road, successfully made his fifth and qualifying jump Friday night at the Parachute School at Fort Benning, Georgia. The tactical night jump completed his Parachute Jump Training which lasted the standard four weeks and which included jumping from towers 250 ft. high and learning completely the technique of safe parachute jumping and landing. He has earned the right to wear the coveted Wings and Boots of the U.S. Army's most modern soldier, The Paratrooper.

The Parachute School at Fort Benning is the school at which all Army paratroopers in Tunisia, Sicily, New Guinea and all over the world, received their initial jump training. In the last six months, as the result of constant study and refinement in instruction, casualties in training have been reduced over one third. At the present time a man jumping from a plane at the Parachute School has less than 1 per cent chance of being injured.

GASOLINE: Stamp A-9 good for 3 gallons through January 21, 1944

FUEL OIL: Stamp 10 in Book 4 good for 5 pounds through January 3, 1944

SUGAR: Stamp 10 in Book 1 and No. 1 "airplane" stamp in Book 3 good for one pair each until further notice

SHOES: Stamp 10 in Book 3 and K in Book 3 expire December 4

MEATS, FATS: Stamp 10 in Book 3 and N, Dec. 5; P, Dec. 12. Expire January 1

PROCESSED FOODS: Stamp 10 in Book 3 and O in Book 4 good through December 20

Stamp 10 in Book 4 and P good through January 20
