The Fourth War Loan Is Coming!

The Fourth War Loan Drive starts January 18, 1944, with a selling quota of \$14,000,000,000 of which \$5,500,000,000 must be raised from individuals. That means that each one of us must do our utmost to invest every possible cent in United States Defense Bonds. Do you know how much that means? It means every penny above the actual cost of living.

It is costing more to live these days than it has in previous years, although figures which have just recently been released prove that prices are being kept down with unusual success. At the same time, most of us are making more today than we ever have before. It is so important that this money be invested in United States Defense Bonds. This is asking so little of us, in return for the sacrifice our young men are making.

You know what they're getting, don't you? Just \$50.00 a month, room and board. And in exchange for that they are asked to give to the utmost of their ability, to constantly study and drill in all kinds of weather and under all conditions, to take orders without any question whatsoever and to carry out those orders, no matter what they may be. And it goes much further than that, too. Some of those boys have given an arm or a leg, some of them are wounded and crippled so badly that it is going to be a struggle to maintain a place in society and some of them won't be back at all—they have paid the greatest price of all. And though they will not be back with us, their memory will live on, as will the cause for which they died.

It is up to us, here on the home front, to back these men to the utmost. Here in Farmington there will be ample opportunity to purchase bonds, for the ladies who have sold bonds in the past will again be on hand at a booth in the Farmington State Bank and at the Civic Theatre. The Theatre will again cooperate in the drive by turning on the house lights each evening, and the ladies will pass through the audience, taking applications for Bonds and selling Stamps.

So come on folks, figure your budget out and see just how many Bonds you will be able to buy during the Fourth War Loan Drive. Make your pledges early and put Farmington away out ahead. Let's show our boys that this is one town that is behind them one hundred per cent—that means every one of us, all the way!

Fertile Acres

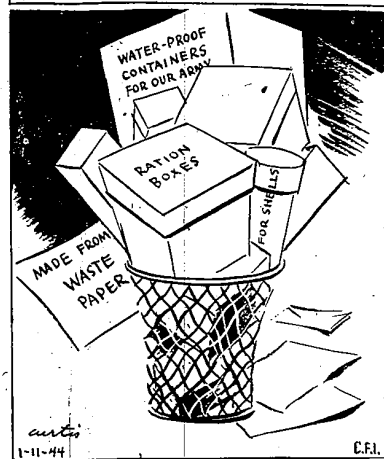

New Food Price Adjustments

To allow food processors upward adjustments of their maximum prices because of wage increases, the Office of Price Administration has amended food regulations covering canned fruits and vegetables, frozen fruits, berries, and vegetables, jams, jellies, pickles and pickled products and apple products. OPA estimated that increases at retail will not run more than one cent a can, or in the case of frozen fruits, one cent a pound. There will be no increases in prices civilians pay for tomatoes, peas, snap beans, corn, peaches and pears.
