Including the task of shampooing an elephant, there are at least a thousand jobs we'd rather not have. Top of the list would be that of trying to explain some of today's domestic headlines to a frontline fighter or a wounded boy out in a foxhole.

"60,000 Workers Out; 1944 Strikes up 42% . . . . "Labor Chiefs Defied" . . . . "Plane Production Crippled." All this while these boys are out dying, or are prepared to die.

We wonder if it isn't those who are labor's staunchest friends who find these things hardest to grasp. Labor's leaders who assume their responsibility as soberly as they assume their power and whose thoughts envisage the future — in short, those worthy of being leaders at all — cannot condone such short-sighted selfishness at America's expense.

It is they who, on several occasions, have sat down voluntarily with the heads of business and management solemnly and with anxious hearts, to find ways and means of keeping our country at full-scale production of the weapons of war. Wedding arrangements for Valley Forge chapel must be made direct with the chapel office and since this chapel is Episcopal, no divorced person may be married there and at least three days notice of the intended ceremony must be given to the rector. If the ceremony is scheduled between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. on a weekday, the chapel fee is \$10; after 5 p. m., \$15. The wedding party may bring its own organist or have the chapel organist play. ## Looking Back Through The Enterprise Files

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO (June 20, 1919)

**West Farmington Graduation**  
The Eighth Grade exercises of School District No. 4, Fractional, will be held in the West Farmington school house this Friday evening. The class will furnish part of the program interspersed with plenty of music. Those graduating are Dorothea Kurz, Freddie Maas, Fraser Hultz, Clinton Roy, Martha Kurz and Howard McCracken.

**Suffers Injuries**  
D. A. Grees, living west of North Farmington, was milking a cow Friday evening when the animal became frightened at something, knocked him over and ran over him, rendering him unconscious. His teeth were knocked together with such force that a gold crown was cracked. He also received a terrible gash on the chin, cutting through to the bone and requiring nine stitches to close the wound.

**Gets Medal**  
Dathas Harger was presented with a gold medal by Base Hospital No. 6, Detroit, the occasion was Boy Scout field day on June 14th. His brother, Lester, came out second on a "fire by friction" contest the same day. Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Harger, witnessed the occasion, it being on the day of their 19th wedding anniversary.

**TEN YEARS AGO (June 28, 1934)**  
Farmington Rink seems injured. Ice skating on a rink of more than an acre in area will be a reality in Farmington next winter, according to plans outlined by Commissioner Emory Hatten this week. Started as a CWA project some time ago but lately discontinued because of more pressing work, the site soon will be the scene of activity again.

**Hogle Named To Direct Improving Work**

home rule viewpoint was generally expressed by county officials last week.

State Treasurer Brake, who is chairman of the state study advisory committee, reported that the committee would complete study within 90 days but that no recommendation was possible by Monday, June 19, date for the special session of the state legislature.

He warned officials flatly that adoption of the sales tax amendment would automatically invoke a crisis in state finances, resulting in alternatives of reducing vital public services of state government or increasing state taxes, referring obviously to the state sales tax itself.

It is Brake's belief that the institute should take a stand on this and any issue that involves the welfare of local governments, regardless of whether it is or may become controversial among public officials and the public.
