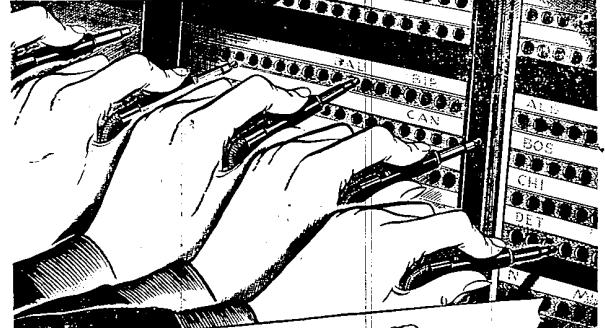

Discard Moldy Foods
Canned foods that show signs of mold should be discarded, save that light mold on jams or jellies may be removed. Not only does mold indicate insufficient sterilization or leakage after canning, but growing mold changes the acidity and protein constituents of food and makes it more susceptible to attack by other organisms such as botulism.

Real Opportunity Comes To Music Lovers

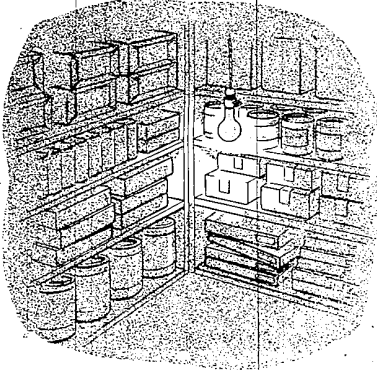
