A Lift For Lenten Menus



HERE'S just the dessert to finish off that mid-Lenten dinner. Slices of Wartime Spice Cake and cups of full-flavored coffee as shown in the above picture will satisfy the family's longing for something really good to eat without dipping into your store of ration coupons. There's nothing like a satisfying dessert and rich, delicious coffee to top off a meal during Lent or any other time.

Have you been longing for a good piece of cake that didn't use up all the shortening and eggs in the house? Then this recipe is just what you need. It takes no eggs at all and uses unrationed suet as shortening. The unexpected and subtle flavor of coffee, which is used as part of the liquid in the recipe, accounts for the unusual flavor. Another point in its favor: this cake keeps indefinitely in a tightly-covered tin box. Here is the recipe for Wartime Spice Cake. Of course, it's tested.

Wartime Spice Cake
1 egg strong hot coffee
1 cup ground suet
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups raisins
1 cup currants or sliced figs

Four hot coffee over ground suet in mixing bowl. Add molasses, sugar, and fruit. Mix and sift the flour, baking powder and spices twice. Stir into first mixture and pour into a 10x4 inch pan and bake in a slow oven (325° F.) about 1 1/2 hours. Note: 1/4 cup ground orange peel may be added to the mixture.

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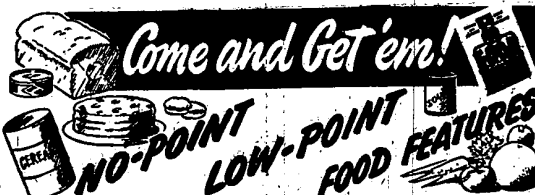
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
