CRESCENT CARNIVAL—Frances Parkinson Keyes. "Crescent Carnival" is the story of Stella Fontaine, a New Orleans Carnival Queen in 1910, of her grandmother, Estelle Leclair, Queen of the summer Krewes fifty years earlier, and of Estelle's daughter, Maria Celeste, who failed to complete the cycle her mother began. It is no less the story of Raoul Bleuven, the young Cajun lawyer, who proves "you can go anywhere from a bayou," and of the Breckenridge men, three generations of charming phandering speedbrills: Andy Breckenridge, whom Estelle was afraid to marry; his son, Breck, whom Marie Celeste could not marry; and his nephew, Drew, whom Stella refused to marry. Most of all, perhaps, it is the story of "little" Patty Forrestal, who has the courage to carry on when the Carnival ends with the war, and who challenges and inspires Drew Breckenridge to reveal the latent strength of fineness in a character which other women have only weakened and coarsened.

In a word, we see Louisiana in an entirety which no other writer has ever achieved, not only as a living entity in itself, but as the setting of passionate and persistent love, enduring from generation to generation, and in the end rekindling the dead ashes of the past to nourish the bright and beautiful fires of the future.
