LEGAL NOTICES

NOTICE OF SCHOOL ELECTION AND THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE FARMINGTON DISTRICT NO. 2, FARMINGTON, IN THE CIRCUIT COURT FOR THE COUNTY OF OAKLAND AND STATE OF MICHIGAN.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified registered voters of School District No. 2, Farmington, City and Township of Farmington, that the annual school election will be held in the school cafeteria on Monday, 12th June 1944. The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., Eastern War Time.

One member of the Board of Education will be elected for a term of three years beginning 1st July 1944 and ending 30th June 1947.

Nominating petitions have been filed for: P. WEAVER.

Notice is hereby given that there will also be submitted at said election two propositions relative to the finances of said district which will hereafter be referred to in this notice as Proposition A and Proposition B.

PROPOSITION A: "Shall the School District borrow a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing certain parcels of land which have been donated by the Board of Education in regular meeting as being necessary additions to the present school site for the best interests of public education in the District, and issue bonds therefor?"

Under the laws of the State of Michigan only those residents of the District who are registered voters and, in addition, are the owners of property within the District which is taxed for school purposes, are eligible to vote at said election.

It is suggested that an elector bring his latest tax receipt with him to the polls when he appears to vote. A majority of more than one-half (51%) of those voters is necessary to carry PROPOSITION A.

PROPOSITION B: "Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against property in the School District for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to 18th December, 1932 be increased for a term of one year from 1944 to 1945 inclusive to two per cent (2%) of the assessed value of all property in the District as provided in Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan?"

Under the laws of the State of Michigan only those residents of the District who are registered voters and, in addition, are the owners of property within the District which is taxed for school purposes, are eligible to vote at said election.

Also notice is hereby given that the regular ANNUAL MEETING of the qualified voters of School District No. 2, Farmington, City and Township of Farmington, County of Oakland and State of Michigan will be held in the school cafeteria on 12th June, 1944 at 8:00 P.M. Eastern War Time, for the consideration and disposition of any matters which may be properly brought to the attention of the District at such meeting.

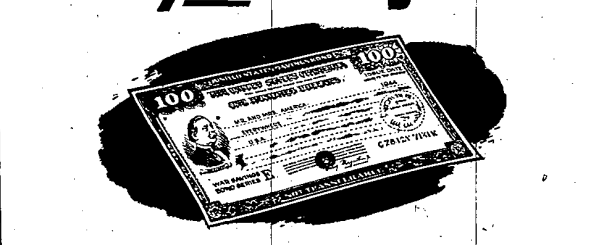
