INCREASE GIVEN
FOR MAINTENANCE
OF HIGHWAYS

The State Highway Department will spend \$194,725.00 during the present fiscal year ending June 30, 1944, on maintenance of state trunkline highways in Oakland County, an increase of \$33,313.00 over the \$160,913.00 spent for the same purpose during the 1942-43 fiscal year, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler reports.

The increased expenditure of state funds in Oakland County this year for state trunkline maintenance is in line with Commissioner Ziegler's policy of an intensive program designed to bring the trunkline system up to satisfactory grade. Trunkline maintenance had been allowed to lag in recent years and many miles of trunklines were in poor condition a year ago. This condition and the necessity for keeping roads in good condition to protect the people's money investment in the roads, to reduce tire wear and to speed wartime traffic prompted the Commissioner to adopt a maintenance program calling for an increase of 40 per cent in expenditures over the entire state as compared to any previous year.

Gravel placed on state trunklines in the last year doubles that of any previous, recent year. A similar program is necessary for this year to build up these highways. Good progress is being made in this work which is resulting in a general improvement in the state highway system, Commissioner Ziegler said.
