Paratrooper Robert Erwin has returned to Camp MacCall, North Carolina, after spending a 12 day furlough at home with his family.

Sgt. Gordon R. Breeding, ball turret gunner on a B-24 Liberator in the 3rd Bombardment Division of the High Air Force, has been awarded the Air Medal for "exceptional achievement, coolness, courage and skill" during bombing attacks on Nazi war making installations.

Sergeant Breeding's wife, Mrs. Nellie Breeding, lives with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John P. MacIntosh, at 3135 Fourteen Mile Road. The Sergeant was employed as a repair man before enlistment. He is a graduate of Farmington High School.

In awarding the Air Medal to the Michigan aviator, Col. Ernest F. Wickert, Jr., group commander, commended the flier's skillful participation in B-24 attacks which are "knocking out German resistance and helping to insure victory for the Allied armies' invasion of Western Europe."

Word has been received from S/Sgt. Joseph W. Wilkinson that he is well, and that he is now somewhere in France.

Private George Bidwell, stationed in the Aleutian area, has written relatives here that he has just received the presidential citation medal, although the actual citation was made some time ago. The citation read: "Battery F, 73d Coast Artillery, Anti-Aircraft, during the period 18 to 20 May, 1943, the 3rd Battalion, 32d Infantry, reinforced, conducted offensive operations in the high mountainous region between East Arm, Holtz Bay and

Chickagof Harbor, Attu, Aleutian Islands. The terrain was exceedingly difficult. Enemy forces were well dug in and skillfully placed, utilizing to the fullest the natural defensive qualities of this area. It soon became apparent that close support of the heaviest available accompanying weapons was necessary, and decision was reached to move two 75 mm pack Howitzers from positions in the relatively low hills between the two arms of Holtz Bay to new positions in direct support of the Battalion. The route to these positions was steep, at times almost precipitous, wet and slippery, partly across snow filled ravines. Man power was the only answer to the problem. The Battery was the only unit available for the job. After two nights of superhuman effort, the Howitzers were moved into place, ammunition was supplied, and a necessary preliminary to the taking of Chickagof pass was accomplished."

Thawing Juices In thawing fruit juices to retain the original flavor, it is important to thaw the juice quickly, keeping the temperature below 40 degrees Fahrenheit. ARREST CLEARS SERIES OF ROBBERIES

By the arrest of Anthony Schmidt, 29, single, living at 884 Schaefer Road, Sheriff Andrew C. Baird seems to have cleared up the series of robberies of out-county taverns which have been reported in the past few weeks. Schmidt was arrested in the act of robbing Erie's Bar on Ford Road at Midvale Road in Garden City in the early hours of Wednesday morning. In Schmidt's car, a 1941 Chevrolet sedan, Sheriff's detectives found a pistol as well as a Deputy Sheriff's badge, bearing the name of Michael Butler, and a money box from a music machine.

Brought to the county jail and questioned, Schmidt admitted the holdup and robbery of the "Hollywood Cafe" in the early morning of August 19th, in the act of which he bound the proprietor, Michael Butler, and stole 32 cases of whiskey and a wallet containing \$900 in cash. He also confessed to robbing the "Three Trees Tavern" on Schaefer Road where his loot consisted of ten cases of whiskey, five cases of beer and about \$50 in cash; the "Nashville Mills Tavern" on Ann Arbor Trail where at the point of a gun he took four cases of whiskey and about \$80 in cash; the "Joy Bar" at Joy and Middle Belt Roads where he stole two cases of whiskey and \$35 in cash; the "Paradise Palms" where his booty consisted of four cases of whiskey and five cases of beer; the "Trail Bar," Ann Arbor Trail, where he took six cases of whiskey; the "Palace Inn" Ann Arbor Trail, where his take was one case of whiskey; and several cartons of cigarettes; "Longton's Bar" on Seven Mile Road, where he stole one electric fan, "Sally's Bar" on West Seven Mile Road where his loot consisted of seven cartons of cigarettes and an auction house on Middle Belt Road in Garden City where he stole \$20 in cash besides a large amount of other plunder. Schmidt also confessed to stealing a public address system from the Parkdale Roller Rink on Plymouth Road some time ago.

At Schmidt's home the sheriff's detectives recovered nine cases of whiskey besides other plunder which had been reported stolen in other robberies.

Schmidt made a formal confession and, upon the issuance of a warrant charging him specifically with the robbery of the Hollywood Cafe, he was arraigned before Judge Mokorsky in Inkster, pleaded guilty, and bound over to the Circuit Court for sentence.

tunity between races of waiting over to the paddock to see their favorite horses at close range.

But probably of greatest interest is the barrier system of starting which eliminates prolonged scoring. After the horses parade to the post and take their two warning up scores, they will go into Starter Hartman's hands and it will be but a few seconds then before they are off. With only 22 minutes between races it will be possible to finish the eight-race program at 11 o'clock each night. Stables have been arriving since Saturday at the track, which in the morning hours is active as trainers put their horses through their workouts. With the oval in tip-top condition and some of the season's outstanding horses some new track records are certain to be made.

Harvey H. Hartman, of Quakertown, Pa., will act as starter. He is one of the leading starting judges in the country. So far this season he has had two of the big assignments in rating, serving as starter at Roosevelt Raceway, Westbury, L.I., and at the 30-day meet which closed two weeks ago at Freshford, N.J. Hartman is now here helping officials get the last minute details of the meet in shape.

Presiding judge will be Wesley Gibbons, of Syracuse, N.Y., while Dr. Plyn Elmer of Jackson and Melville C. Hart of Farmington will serve as associate judges. H. D. Clark of Northville will be paddock judge. Chief clerk is Edmund P. Yerkes, of Northville, with J. Rueling Cutler, of Plymouth, and Fred Van Atta, of Northville, as associates.

The daily double, now one of the popular features of all racing programs, will be the first and second races each night with the DD windows closing five minutes before the first race.

Secretary H. B. Denison and his associates have made plans to take care of a record crowd for the opening night. A new attendance record for Northville racing should be established for the inaugural, while banner crowds also are expected for both the second and third nights, Saturday and Monday, Labor Day.

Floor Stains Those black marks made on waxed floors by wartime heels and soles can be removed with wax, turpentine or cleaning fluid such as carbon tetrachloride, according to Mrs. Dorothy I. Iwig, home furnishings specialist, University of Illinois college of agriculture.

Rub the mark with a cloth moistened with carbon tetrachloride or with turpentine. The grease solvent will remove the wax along with the black, so wax should be applied to the floor after removal.

Sugar for Canning In making sirup for canning fruits at home, honey or corn sirup can be used in combination with sugar, to ease the strain on the sugar budget.
