The Time For Decision—Sumner Welles. In "The Time for Decision," Sumner Welles urges the vital need of immediately setting up effective machinery for settling

international problems, and proposes a specific plan for world organization. Believing that the foundations of the present war were laid in the years since Versailles, and that only by resolving now to learn from past errors can we prevent a third world war, he reviews the events of the last twenty-five years and examines the course of our policy in relation to them. The result is a unique book, at once authoritative and revealing, so that the reader absorbs from it the first-hand knowledge and experience of a great diplomatist.

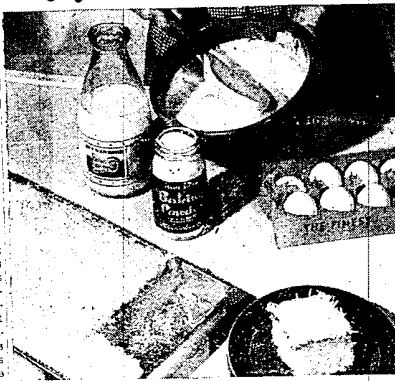
Writing with frankness and at times with indignation, in a book which tells the story of men as well as events, Mr. Welles puts the blame squarely on those responsible for the faults and failures of our policy, and points out how war might have been avoided. In the first part, he covers the mistakes of the treaty-makers at Versailles, the blindness of the world's statesmen during the tragic years that followed. The reader follows with mounting interest this informed narrative of crisis after crisis between two wars, climaxed by the dramatic and intimately personal account of the author's trip to Europe in 1940, as the President's personal emissary to the heads of the belligerent states.

America Unlimited—Eric Johnston. Eric Johnston attracted nationwide attention immediately after his election to the presidency of the United States Chamber of Commerce. As the representative of some 600,000 businessmen, his first official act was to make friendly calls on President Roosevelt, President Green of the AFL, and President Murray of the CIO. Since then he has continued to amaze radicals and conservatives alike with his unusually progressive ideas on labor, big business, and what he has chosen to call "people's capitalism." "America Unlimited" is the summing up of these ideas and represents his most profound convictions regarding the economic future of this country.

With compelling enthusiasm, Mr. Johnston comes out for the tried-and-true American maxims of freedom and opportunity. His confident enthusiasm gives them an extraordinarily fresh and exciting vitality. He cogently states his case for a people's capitalism with the emphasis on rugged individualism, private enterprise, and the competitive spirit. These values still hold good, he insists, because of the miracle of American abundance.

Preserve Garbage Pail
To preserve the garbage pail for the duration, treat it to a thorough washing with soap once a week followed by a hot water rinse and thorough sunning. Asphaltum varnish will give the metal a water-proof coating and prevent rust.

Large Cake Yields Many Servings



"Get-Together" Cake is ideal recipe for serving large groups.

When the occasion calls for an extra large cake, try this new tested recipe for "Get-Together" Cake.

It makes a single large loaf (8 x 16 inch pan) or three good-sized loaves. You should be able to get 16 to 18 generous servings, either way.

For best results, follow the methods that were used in developing this new recipe. For instance, all the ingredients were used at room temperature. This makes for smoother mixing, finer texture and more tenderness. The baking powder was a kind that comes packed in a durable jar with an airtight, resealable cap to keep it fresh and preserve strength. The cake was cooled after baking on a rack, so that air could circulate under the pan to prevent the cake from becoming too moist on the bottom. Now for the recipe:

"Get-Together" Cake: Sift cake flour. Measure 3 c. and sift together with 3 t. glossed baking

powder and 1/2 t. salt. Cream 3/4 c. shortening. Add 1 1/2 c. sugar gradually, creaming after each addition. Add 3 eggs one at a time and beat thoroughly after each addition. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with 3/4 t. almond extract and 1 c. bottled milk. Pour batter into well-greased 8 x 16 x 1 1/2 inch loaf pan or three 9-inch layer pans. Bake in moderate oven (375 deg. F.), 25 to 30 min. for loaf, 20 to 25 min. for layers. Cool and frost.

Seven-Minute Frosting: Combine 2 unbeaten egg whites, 1/4 c. sugar, 5 T. water, 1/2 t. bottled syrup, 1/2 teaspoon salt in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary beater until thoroughly blended. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat constantly until frosting stands in peaks (about 7 min.). Remove from boiling water. Add 1/2 t. almond extract and beat until thick enough to spread on cake. Sprinkle with shredded coconut, if available.

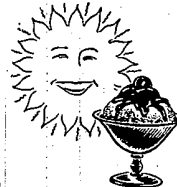
