This week Dr. W. J. Westcott announced the opening of an office and veterinary hospital at 24429 Grand River to serve the Farmington area and northwestern Detroit.

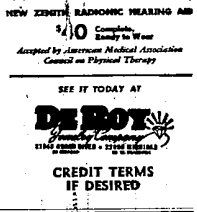
Dr. Westcott is a graduate of Michigan State College, where he interned and was an assistant instructor in the Veterinary Clinic.
