ISLAND ON THE BEAM—A Story of Malta—Josephine Blackstock. In the new story Miss Blackstock has chosen for the background the island of Malta, which has been called "the most bombed spot in the world." Pietro Mattio, a young Maltese boy, is the hero of the tale, and we come to know his beautiful island home as he knows it, first in the days of peace and later when the war clouds centered over it, and poured down their hail of metal. Pietro was one of a large family, father, mother, sisters, uncles and the small brother, George, who will win the heart of every reader. Pietro has English friends, too, young John Rhodes and his sister, Iris, and David, one of that pathetically small group of pilots who attempted to defend Malta when the big attack came.

Pietro and Italian cousins who worked hard before Italy entered the war to enlist the sympathies of the Maltese population. But most of them stood firm, though Pietro, in a sudden anger at his English friends, almost gave away valuable military secrets to the enemy. But the opportunity came, at a time when help was needed desperately, to redeem his error.

Island On The Beam is full of interesting information about an island which, in spite of its prominence in the news, is unknown territory to many American readers. It tells a thrilling story of immediate and exciting interest; it introduces us to a group of attractive characters who experience and endure nobly the relentless attacks this war has produced.

THE SINGING TREE — Kate Seredy. At the Good Master's ranch, on the Hungarian plains, everything was gay and carefree for Jancsi and his cousin Kate. The whole countryside turned out for the colorful folk-festivals and weddings; the bees droned among the acacia blossoms by old Uncle Moses's store in the village.

Then the Great War came, and all this jollity was suddenly gone. The women and children were left in charge. For two years Jancsi was the Master on the Nagy ranch, the haven of relatives and prisoners and refugee children, and his mother and Kate held this world together.

It is a beautiful and stirring story. Young people will take it to their hearts, for it truly is their book. It sings like the Singing Tree itself, full of birds greeting the dawn, of which Kate's uncle, Marton, tells when he returns home.

Synthetic Tubes
Since synthetic tubes are rather easily damaged in mounting and removing, sharp pointed bars or screw drivers should not be used. Even with blunt tire tools care should be taken to avoid puncturing a synthetic tube. When damaged, synthetic tubes are harder to repair and usually require vulcanizing by competent repairmen. The old style cold patches are not dependable and should be considered for a short emergency only.
