Jim Roberts, another son of Mrs. Roberts, is with the Navy in the South Pacific.

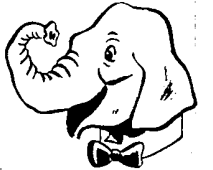
Ted Grant, whose parents live on Farmington Road, is in the South Pacific.
