FALCONS EDGE REDFORD UNION IN FROSH GAME

A battling band of Farmington freshmen salvaged victory from certain defeat by scoring twice in the second half of a game played last Thursday on the local field. A goodly crowd was gathered to view future Farmington gridiron stars when the teams squared off for the opening kickoff.

Redford Union dominated the first half play as it penetrated the Falcons' defense almost at will. In the second period Redford Union marched 55 yards to score; they made good the extra point and led 7-0. John Greco gave the fans a chance to yell in the second quarter by kicking 59 sensational yards with an intercepted forward pass, only to be tackled from behind. The Falcons couldn't cash in on this scoring opportunity as they lost a race with time, leaving Redford leading 7-0 at half time.

Redford Union dominated the third quarter as they started to roll over and through the visitors. Farmington finally tied up the ball game in this period when John Greco took a Weaver-throw aerial for 35 yards and a score. Quarterback Weaver tied up the ball game by smashing over the extra point.

In the fourth canto the two teams fought on even terms, and it appeared that a tie game would result from the afternoon's festivities. Redford Union, however, obligingly fumbled late in the period with Farmington recovering. A penalty placed the ball on the Redford Union one-yard line, from which point John Greco hurried over for the winning touchdown as the game ended with Farmington the victors 13-7.

The Falcons travel to Redford for a return game this week. An interesting sidelight on the game was the fact that Farmington had 14 boys in uniform, while Redford Union had about 25 ready to go into the game.
