CHRISTMAS FEAST. In place of the traditional turkey during the holidays, our Home Service Department unveils a roast duck that's different:

Roast Duck with Orange Stuffing
3 cups dry bread crumbs 1/2 cup orange juice
1 cup diced apple 1/4 cup melted butter or
1/2 cup seedless raisins substitute
4 tbsps. sugar Salt and pepper

Mix ingredients in order given and season to taste with salt and pepper. Add more or less liquid as may be needed, depending on dryness of crumbs.

Duck with orange stuffing may be garnished with water-cress or parsley and with sections of orange dipped in thick sugar syrup. Serve duck with an orange sauce made by adding one-half cup strained orange juice to two cups
